**RETAILERS RALLYING TO THRIFT MOVEMENT**

A clarion call to retail dealers throughout the country to aid in spreading the gospel of happy thrift and promote the government's work of selling Thrift and War Savings Stamps has been issued by the Treasury Department through the newly created Savings' division. Already the list of retailers who had Savings societies in their organization actively operating last year, has been augmented by hundreds of new recruits to the list. Promising reports received to date by the government already indicate that many large retail associations in the country, some with 2000 and 3000 branches, have responded to the appeal and started the establishment of savings societies in each of their branches.

The Treasury Department bases its appeal to the retailer on his expert knowledge of business and his appreciation of the fundamentals of the conservative handling of money and the elimination of waste as a

matter of every day routine in his trades.

In an address "The Value of Public Thrift as a Stabilized of Business", recently delivered before the National Retail Dry Goods association convention in New York, William Mather Lewis of the Savings' division of the Treasury Department, said in part:

"The more thrifty the people of a community are, the more promptly they pay their bills; and the more promptly they pay their bills, the more remote becomes the possibility of failure.

"Waste is an enemy of good business. In certain districts of New York investigators found that 11

percent of the contents of the garbage cans was perfectly good stuff.

"The amount of usable material abandoned in this country every year amounts to millions."
