SHIPPING BY TRUCK.

Shipping by truck has been declared the great tap root of America's transportation system. Certain it is that shipping by truck broadens the scope and increases the usefulness of the railroads. Trucks can transport freight at a profit in territories and under conditions in which railroads would carry them at a loss. Shipping by truck makes necessary the construction and operation of extensive branch rail lines of doubtful earning capacities, or at least makes it possible to postpone the construction of such lines until sufficient tonnage should be developed to justify them. Shipping by truck will relieve railroads of a large percentage of the short-haul and less-than-car-load shipments, which add to expenses and difficulties of railway operation without adequately increasing the income. Trucks will carry to the railroads freights that they would not secure otherwise—timber from forests, products from farms and minerals from fastnesses that are inaccessible to the railroads. Since the truck will do these things, it will at the same time aid in the development of sections and territories as could be done in no other way.
