SERVICE NOTES

The conversion of term insurance is engaging the time of the Home Service Section very strenuously at present. For a time the conversion of insurance has been inadvisable, but now the Insurance Division of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance authorizes conversion of insurance in any numbers desired by discharged service men. The Home Service Section has all the information necessary and will give every possible assistance to the soldiers and sailors in making application for conversion.

On July 1st premiums on all Government term insurance policies automatically increase to the next higher rate. This does not apply to policies already converted to one of the six standard forms, on which the premiums are level.

One thing the Red Cross Department of Civilian Relief is doing these days is to see that every crippled soldier or sailor "gets back into the game" just as close to his original self as science can make him—that is the idea of the Government.

The Government provides for the fitting, replacing, and keeping in repair of every artificial limb or appliance required by its crippled fighters and the Red Cross is helping to see that all who need these things apply to Uncle Sam for them.

The excellence of these artificial adjuncts to the human body is remarkable. Miss Mary Ann Abel of the Southern Division headquarters attended a baseball game in Washington recently in which every member of both teams had lost a leg or an arm, and it was a good, close, hard-fought game of ball too.

The Red Cross is asking each Home Service Section to visit every disabled soldier in their various

jurisdiction. This visit is for two reasons, first to tell how glad we are that he is at home, and how much we appreciate his services for humanity; second to offer him any assistance the Red Cross may be able to give him in applying for vocational training, conversion of insurance, arrears of pay and any other of the perplexities of the returned soldier or sailor.

The Abbeville Home Service Section so far has been unable to make any visits for two reasons: First, the Section has no automobile for use in transportation, and second, the secretary cannot walk that far. This situation offers a fine opportunity for volunteers, and this service is just as important as knitting sweaters or troop trains. Who will be the first to offer their car for at least one afternoon?
