MR. EARLE AT CLEMSON.

Clemson College, Aug. 31.—Drayton E. Earle, formerly of the textile department at Clemson, now with the bureau of markets, United States department of agriculture, was here this week to perfect arrangements concerning cotton grading work to be done jointly by the bureau of markets and the extension service in several counties of South Carolina during the coming season. An expert cotton grader will be stationed in the seven counties, Orangeburg, Darlington, Sumter, Laurens, Clarendon, Anderson and Greenwood, for the purpose of classing and grading cotton for the benefit of farmers.

Hon. J. M. Baker's Position.

Hon. James M. Baker, Lowndesville, former secretary of the Senate,

has qualified as deputy commissioner of internal revenue in charge of the division of sales taxes in the internal revenue bureau. The position is one of responsibility and pays \$5,000 per year.
