How to Cut, Plant, and Spray Irish Potatoes.

Irish potatoes should be cut so that the eyes will have plenty of food. When the eyes have plenty of food they will not die. They should be planted in rows and packed as soon as they are planted. When they are planted in rows they can be cultivated and will make a greater yield than those that are not cultivated. When the bugs get on the potatoes, spray them with arsenate of lead or a lead spray mixture.
