

Supply Ordinance

To Raise Supplies for the City of Abbeville, S. C., for the Fiscal Year, 1920.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Abbeville, S. C., in Council assembled, and by authority of the same, that a tax for the sums and in a manner hereinafter named shall be raised and paid into the treasury of the City Council for the uses and purposes for the fiscal year, 1920.

NOTICE is hereby given that the office of the City Treasurer of Abbeville, S. C., will open for collection of taxes for the said fiscal year as follows:

City taxes ----- 5 mills
Waterworks tax (interest on bonds and sinking funds) ----- 2 mills

1920, from Saturday, November 1st, 1919, until Wednesday, Dec. 31, 1919 without penalty.

Rates per centum of taxation are Electric Light Tax, (int. on bond and sinking fund) ----- 2 mills
Sewerage tax (int. on Bond and sinking fund) ----- 2 mills
For Street Paving (int. on Bonds and Sinking Fund) ----- 5 mills

That when the taxes and assessments or any portion thereof charged against the property or party on the tax books of the city for the fiscal year 1920, shall not be paid on or before the first day of January, 1920, the City Treasurer shall proceed to add a penalty of one per cent. on the tax books and the City Treasurer shall collect the same, and if the said taxes, assessments and penalties are not paid on or before the first day of February next, thereafter an additional penalty of one per centum shall be added by the City Treasurer, and if said taxes assessments and penalties are not paid on or before the first day of March next, thereafter, an additional penalty of five per centum thereon, shall be added by the City Treasurer, and be collected by him; and if the said taxes, assessments and penalties are not paid on or before the fifteenth day of March next thereafter, the said City Treasurer shall issue his Tax execution for said taxes, assessments and penalties against the property of the defaulting tax payers according to law.

A Commutation Road Tax will be collected the same time as other taxes from all male citizens between the ages of 18 and 55 years, except those exempted by law.

The Commutation Tax is as follows: The sum of Two (\$2.00) Dollars, payable before March 31st, 1920, the sum of Two and 50-100 (\$2.50) Dollars, if not paid until and during the month of April, 1920, the sum of Three (\$3.00) Dollars if not paid until and during the month of May, 1920. In lieu of this tax six days work upon the highways and

streets of the City will be required under the street overseer.

All persons failing or refusing to pay the Commutation Tax or to work the six full days shall, upon conviction, be fined not more than thirty dollars or imprisoned more than thirty days.

Done and ratified in the City Council, this 23rd day of September, 1919.

Treat Oat Seed Against Smut.

Clemson College, Sept. 30.—The season for planting fall oats is at hand and farmers are reminded to treat all oat seed for smut before planting. At very little cost and trouble several bushels per acre in the total yield can thus be saved. The following methods are recommended:

Dry Method: Mix one pint of formaldehyde with one pint of water and use in small hand sprayer. Atomizer sprayers can be purchased for 50 to 75 cents. Spray the solution on grain as this is being shoveled over, holding sprayer close to grain and taking care that the mist is well distributed. One quart of solution will treat 50 bushels. When all grain is treated, shovel into a pile, and carefully cover for five hours as directed under the wet method. The grain may be sown immediately after the treatment, or allowed to air thoroughly and stored in disinfected sacks or bins until needed.

Wet Method: Sprinkle seed until thoroughly moist with solution of one pint of formaldehyde to 40 gallons of water, shoveling over repeatedly to distribute moisture evenly. Forty gallons will treat 60 bushels. Shovel into a pile and cover with sacks, canvas, or blankets for two hours or over night. Dry by spreading in thin layer and stirring occasionally with rake. Seed may be sown when dry enough to run freely through the drill, setting the drill to sow about 2 pecks more per acre to allow for swollen condition of grain. If to be stored for seven days or longer, dry thoroughly. Disinfect sacks, and drill, to prevent re-infection of the seed.

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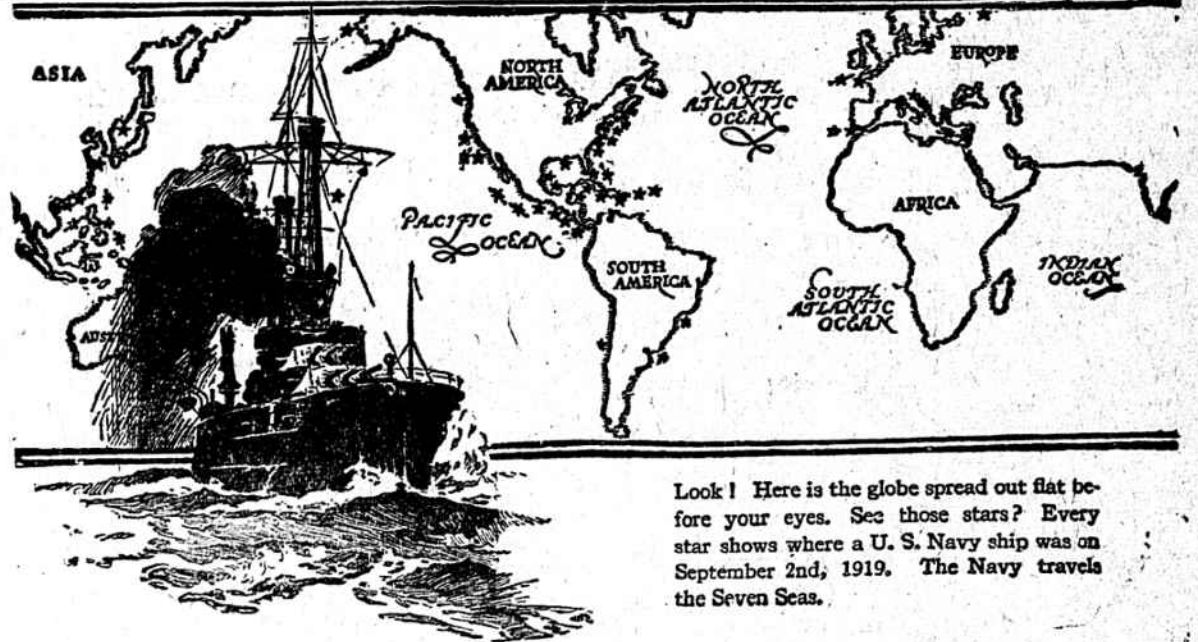
