

**GET POTATO HOUSES READY.**

The harvesting period for sweet potatoes is at hand, and it is of vital importance that ample storage be properly provided, says George P. Hoffman, Extension horticulturist. The standard storage house is the one sure way of keeping potatoes, and this house for best results should

have thorough cleansing, disinfecting, airing, and artificial drying, especially previously used houses in which rots have given trouble. New and unused houses will need only thorough drying out by artificial heat.

The cleansing, disinfecting, etc., should be done a week or ten days before the house is to be used, and

thorough drying by heat should be given over a period of 12 to 24 hours before the potatoes are to be stored and the heat discontinued, weather conditions permitting, until all the crop is harvested and stored. Otherwise, uniform curing will not be given and there may be poor keeping as results of overcuring or undercuring. Several methods of disinfecting are recommended.

1. Whitewashing. Apply, with a spray pump or brush, a good coat of standard whitewash, or mixture of bmn p| mke c cropo etaod chmw whitewash and winter strength lime-sulphur solution. One application is sufficient.

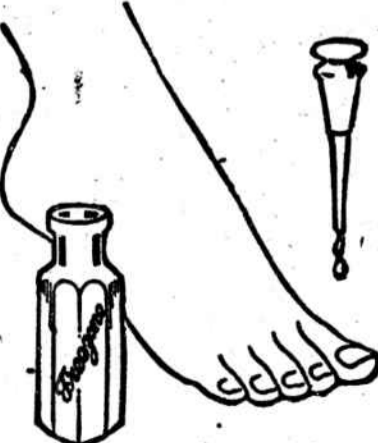

Despite the many promises of the Germans to the American people that they would not harm her, on October 12th they lined her up against the wall and shot her.
