#### CHARGES AGAINST ANDERSON SHERIFF

There is a considerable stir in Anderson, according to reports reaching here, in regard to certain charges against Sheriff Sanders, of that county. Mr. W. J. Cormack, the Columbia correspondent of the News and Courier, thus writes his paper in regard to the matter:

"As a result of a sensational story published in an Anderson newspaper yesterday, charges of a serious nature against the conduct of J. Olin Sanders, sheriff of Anderson county, were referred to Governor Cooper this morning.

"Governor Cooper immediately communicated with T. Frank Watkins, senator from Anderson county, and requested him to have Sheriff Sanders file a statement with the governor relative to the allegations. Sanders was appointed by Gov-

ernor Cooper as sheriff of Anderson county January 29 to succeed Joe M. H. Ashley, upon the resignation of the latter. The appointment was made on the recommendation of Senator Watkins, and Sheriff Sanders has made a first-class peace officer.

"It is thought here that, should the allegations against the sheriff be founded on fact, Governor Cooper will ask for his resignation. This is the only way that he can be gotten out of office without the procedure laid down in the constitution, as the State Supreme court, in the case of the State of South Carolina against W. W. Huckabee, late sheriff of Kershaw county, stated the rule that the governor could not dismiss a constitutional officer elected by the people."
