

Washington, Nov. 14.—A maximum wholesale price of 10 1-2 cents a pound for all beet sugars at all points in the United States was established today by the department of justice.

New Schedule Signed For Customs Duties

Washington, Nov. 15, 1919-President Wilson today signed an executive order establishing a new sched-ule for customs duties based on the reduced values of foreign currencies.

D'Annunzio Said to Have left Fiume Trieste, Nov. 14.—A telegram to the stock exchange here states that Gabriele d'Annunzio has left Fiume.

Ending of War New Orleans, Nov. 14 .- The President of the United States is the only person who can say when the war with Germany ended, and therefore, the sale or carrying of intoxicating liquor into territory adjacent to a military camp or cantonment is forbidden until he does so, ruled the United States circuit court of appeals today in affirming the sentence of 15 months in the federal penitentiary imposed upon Lucien C. Slaughter, of Tarrent county, Texas, after a trial before the federal court of the northern district of Texas.


