MOVING ERSKINE.

There are no reports whatever from Due West on the agitation started in Abbeville and taken up in Greenville, Greenwood and Spartanburg to move Erskine College from its "sacred seat" or "site" and relocate it in Abbeville, Greenwood or Spartanburg. Due West feels the security of tradition. But it is not unusual for colleges to be moved. Lander College was moved from Williamston to Greenwood. Bailey Military Institute was moved from Edgefield to Greenwood. Both these institutions are flourishing and the transplanting process was of immense value in stimulating growth in the fertile Greenwood soil. Chicora College was moved from Greenville to Columbia. Columbia Female College was moved from its location in Columbia to a site outside the city limits. The Citadel is soon to be moved from the historic tobacco market site in Charleston to a larger and better location outside the city. Citadel Square will soon be only a name to be preserved.

John Hopkins University was moved some years ago from its original site in Baltimore to a larger campus outside the city. Richmond College is now in process of moving. The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary founded in Greenville was moved to Louisville many years ago and has grown wonderfully since that time and now is preparing to sell its property in the city and move to another location just outside the city.

Evidence might be multiplied but what's the use to pile Pelion on Osse? The thing has been done and can be done again.

In this week's issue of the Press and Banner, Judge William Pinkney Greene, as Major Hemphill affectionately and appropriately calls him, for he has proven that he is judge of high ability and is a distinct ornament to the bench in every way rather yields to the temptation to display impatience with the idea that location has anything to do with the success of a college. What a college needs he says, is the "ambrosial cash" to "grease the machinery with," words which being interpreted mean that money must be put up to meet the running expenses, pay better salaries to professors and buy needed equipment.

All of which is sadly true. Cash must be had and that is why we are undergoing and recovering from the

drives which have just passed over us with almost cyclonic effect. These are to provide cash.

The value of Erskine College to any community would be great. To Greenwood it would be worth more than the quarter of a million which Judge Greene has proposed on the part of Abbeville. Greenwood does not propose to jump in and raise, the term being readily understood in Abbeville, but she is willing to offer a larger sum if any sum will influence the authorities to consider moving Erskine College from its present location.

A magnificent campus can be offered here, there are several citizens who are feverishly anxious to offer suitable sites of broad acres and all that. And more than enough money to put up suitable buildings can be had whenever there is any intimation that the moving proposition will be considered.—Index—Journal.
