LEGIONNAIRES CALL FOR HASTE IN CONGRESS ON INSURANCE EXTENSION

Washington, Dec. 16.—Under plans of officers of the American Legion, in session here, congress would be called upon directly to hasten legislation favorable to veterans of the world war.

Senators would be asked why they had not concurred in the house action on the Sweet bill to extend the benefits of the war risk insurance act. The delegates have tentatively decided to urge congress to combine under one head the war risk insurance bureau, the public health service and the federal board for vocational education, claiming that under this system state legion officers could better cooperate with the government in the interest of ex-service men.

The delegates also agreed to recommend a revision of the Sweet bill to create a system of forty-eight

state directors for the war risk bureau instead of the fourteen regional directors as provided in the measure.
