VERDICT OF GUILTY
 IN BARBOT'S CASE
 Columbia, Jan. 26.—Special: Dr. Louis C. Barbot, a widely known physician of the City of Charleston, was convicted by a jury in the Federal Court here tonight of violation of the Harrison anti-narcotic act on fourteen counts.
 The specific charge was that he had administered narcotics illegally to fourteen drug addicts not in the course of treatment for such cases. On the two counts that he had not kept a proper record of dispensing narcotics to patients, the jury acquitted him.
 He was not sentenced by Judge Henry A. M. Smith presiding, as Mayor John P. Grace, of Charleston, an argument for a new trial on Friday.

The maximum penalty which can be given Dr. Barbot on each count is \$2,000 fine or five years' imprisonment, but this can be reduced by the trial judge in his discretion. The maximum penalty under the physician could be a fine of \$28,000 or seventy years' imprisonment.
 The principal witnesses today were those for the government, who gave expert testimony on the administration of drugs to addicts and Dr. Barbot, himself, who told of his practice, particularly that of drug habits.
