MEXICAN REBELS CONTINUE GAINS

Washington, May 7.—Reports, official and unofficial, today credited the Mexican rebels with further bloodless successes. Information reaching the rebel agents here they said, pointed to an early occupation of Piedras Negras, Laredo and Matamoros, the only important border ports of entry remaining in Carranza control. News of the revolt of the garrison at Vera Cruz was received through official channels, the town being immediately evacuated by the rebels presumably because of the presence in the harbor of Mexican gunboats, yet loyal to Carranza.

Official confirmation of the report received early in the day by rebel agents that Carranza already had left the capital was lacking tonight.

The state department received several messages from the embassy in Mexico City but they were all silent. These dispatches made no mention of Carranza's intention of leaving the capital, it was said.

Dispatches from rebel sources reported Luis Cabrera head of the Carranza cabinet, was en route today by train for Piedras Negras and that Alfonso Cabrera, brother of the cabinet minister, had been arrested by General Gonzalez in Puebla. Alfonso Cabrera, while governor of Puebla, was concerned in the prosecution of American consular agent W. O. Jenkins.

Developments along the border today suggested three possible fights near the United States border. The commander of the Laredo garrison appears to have held his men in line notwithstanding the defection of customs and immigration guards, but rebels were reported to have captured a trainload of federal reinforcements between Lampazos and the border town.

"IRISH REPUBLIC" IN DISCUSSION

London, May 6.—The subject of the support given "to the Irish Republic" by some persons in the United States came up in the house of commons today. Horatio Bottomley asked whether the government was aware that appeals for subscriptions for bonds advised by DeValera, as "president of the Irish republic," were still appearing in American papers and were supported by the governors of various states; and whether Great Britain proposed to make representations on the matter to President Wilson. Bonar Law, replying in behalf of the government, said it was understood that such appeals were still appearing in certain American papers but he was not in a position to say whether they were supported by any governor. Great Britain, he added, was not prepared to make representations.

Mr. Bottomley asked whether Mr. Bonar Law had seen the announcement that already 2,000,000 pounds had been subscribed to the fund and that triumphant processions had gone through the principal streets of the United States in celebration of the event and that DeValera had been entertained by state governors. He asked if Mr. Bonar Law did not consider that in international law this amounted to an unfriendly act and whether new instructions would be given to the British ambassador.
