

WEEKLY GOVERNMENT CROP AND WEATHER REPORT

Texas
Light to moderate rains, mostly in the western half, and seasonable temperatures favored plant growth and planting and cultivation. Cotton is improving; condition rather poor to very good; planting continues in the northwest; elsewhere cultivation and chopping made good progress although there are complaints of labor shortage. Cotton grassy in northwest elsewhere mostly clean. Weevil are active in southwest but complaints are less numerous.

Oklahoma
The week was clear, warm and dry. Soil moisture generally sufficient except in parts of western portion, where rain is needed. Cotton made generally excellent progress crop late. Rather poor to very good condition.

Georgia
Dry, warm weather with abundant sunshine made week most favorable of season and all crops made excellent growth. Cultivation

progressed rapidly many farmers are well up with their works. Warm nights were especially favorable for cotton which made excellent progress, though plants are still small and late and weevil numerous. Cotton is now generally well cultivated.

Alabama
Fair warm weather was favorable and all crops improved, cultivation made good progress. Cotton is in fair to good condition; plants are quite generally small. Chopping made good progress in the north; weevils are numerous and doing some damage in the south; the crop continues seriously grassy in some sections.

Mississippi
Crops made excellent growth and cultivation showed excellent progress but cotton and corn are about two weeks behind the season.

Arkansas
No rain and rather high temperatures were very favorable for farm work and especially, favorable for cotton, which made good progress. The crop is late but condition is satisfactory. Cultivation made good progress but fields are still grassy

in many places and labor scarce.

North Carolina
Weather was favorable for marked improvement of most crops. Cotton made good to excellent progress over its previous rather poor condition.

Tennessee
Clear warm weather was very favorable for much planting, cultivating and hay cutting. Cotton made satisfactory progress the crop is mosaly well cultivated.

Florida
Cotton improved and the progress of the cotton is satisfactory to good. Slight rain and high temperatures although the plants are small.

Louisiana
Light to moderate scattered showers with high temperatures were favorable for growth of all crops and cultivation made good progress. Condition of cotton fair to good.

South Carolina
No rain with warm days and nights were especially favorable for cotton which has improved to near the average generally, but is still somewhat backward incident to considerable replanting on account of recent damage by lice.

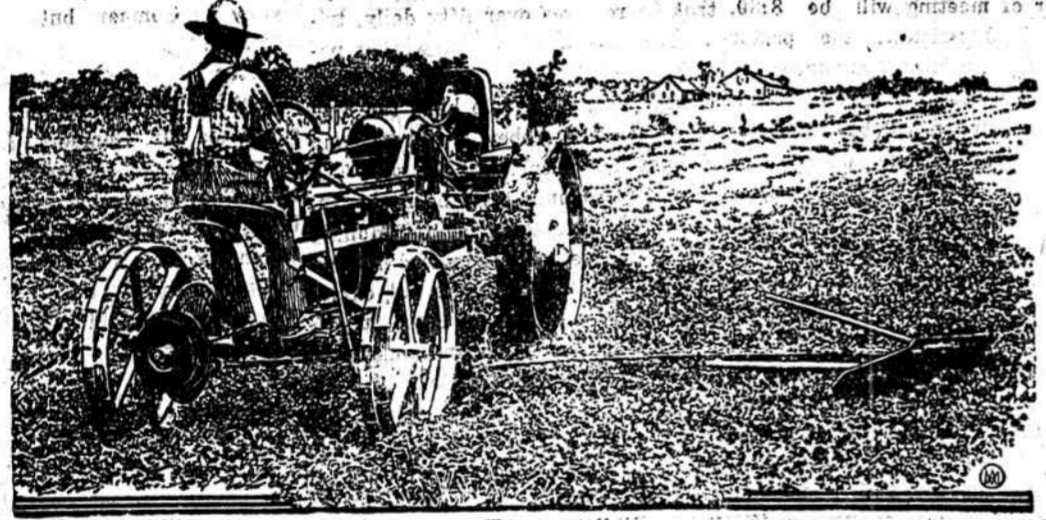

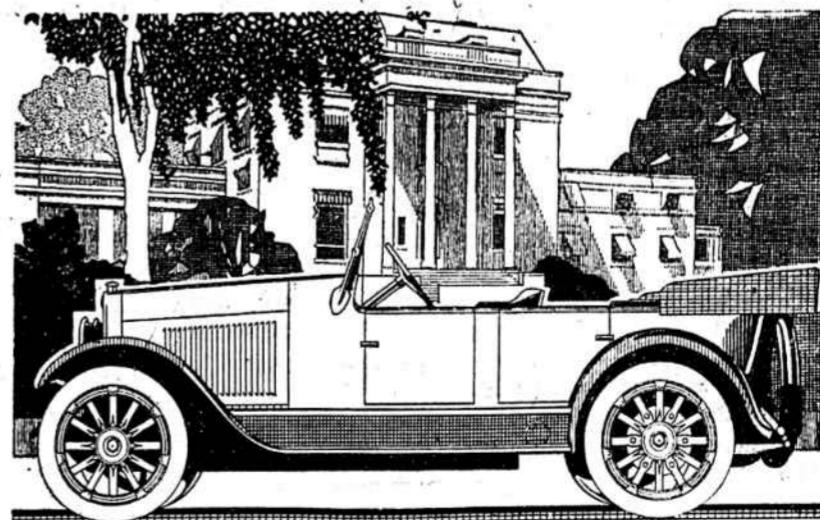
