POLAND TO TAKE LEAD IN PARLEY

Paris, Aug. 26.—Poland has decided to take the initiative in the Russo-Polish negotiations and propose new peace terms to the Soviet that conform with the present military situation, said a Warsaw dispatch to the Matin.

According to an unofficial report from Warsaw detachments of the Second Polish Brigade entered Grodno Tuesday, but the Polish Legation has no confirmation.

It was admitted at the Polish legation that General Budenny's Red cavalry army reached the outskirts of Lemberg, in Galicia, before being driven back.

RUSSIANS IN ONE SECTOR COUNTER-ATTACK

Paris, Aug. 26.—The Russian Army in the Bielostok sector of the Northern Polish battle front has begun a counter-attack, according to advices reaching the Polish Legation from Warsaw.

VILNA SACKED POLES REPORT

London, Aug. 26.—A Central News dispatch from Warsaw Thursday reported that the following communique was issued by the Polish War Office: "We have captured Ostroleka and forced a new passage of the Narew River. A portion of the Red Army in the Mlawa sector has escaped after desperate fighting, retiring eastward. The Bolshevik forces that evacuated Vilna sacked the city."
