DOMINICK WINS BY 4,000 VOTES

RETURNS INDICATE SECOND RACE FOR U. S. SENATE

HUBERT COX NAMED FOR HOUSE—ASHLEY AND PUTNAM RUN OVER.

J. L. PERRIN ELECTED, CARRYING EVERY BOX IN COUNTY—McCLANE SHERIFF

Paul Mann is Nominated for Superintendent of Education, E. W. Nance for Sub-Supervisor and Probably G. W. Calvert.—Second Race For Supervisor.—Other News From the State.

The election in Abbeville County passed off quietly yesterday. A few less than 2100 people registered their choice for the various offices.

A tabulation on this page gives the detailed vote, from which it will be seen that:

Hubert Cox is nominated for the House of Representatives, with a second race for the other place between Messrs Thos. A. Putnam and Melvin J. Ashley.

Capt. J. L. Perrin has been renominated for Clerk of Court by a vote of about three and a half to one over his opponent, Major R. B. Cheatham.

Foster B. McClane has won out for sheriff over both his opponents by a comfortable majority.

Paul H. Mann has won a victory over Will John Evans for County Superintendent of Education by a good majority.

Supervisor Stevenson will go in a second race for that office with Walter Keller, no one having received a majority of the votes for that office.

E. W. Nance is renominated for Sub-Supervisor and probably Geo. W. Calvert is also, but on the face of the figures Mr. Calvert appears to lack a few votes of a majority. It may take the official count to decide this.

R. S. McComb has decisively defeated Judge M. E. Hollingsworth for the Magistrate's office at Abbeville.

J. Howard Moore made a run-away race for solicitor in this county. It appears that a second race will be necessary for this office between him and Solicitor Blackwell.

Fred H. Dominick has decisively defeated W. W. Bradley for Congress from this district.

J. C. Cox was re-nominated coroner without opposition.

The state candidates received the following votes in this county, not counting Abbeville No. 2 and Hampton, which had not come in at the time of the tabulation:

H. Klugh Purdy, Senator from Jasper County has been defeated for re-election.

RESULTS IN OTHER COUNTIES.

In Anderson County, James N. Pearman, Clerk of Court, has been defeated for re-election by a vote of more than 2 to 1 by J. Clarence Taylor.

In that county Sheriff C. G. King, who was appointed by Governor Cooper on the removal of Olin Sanders, leads with a vote of 1700 as against 1367 for his nearest opponent. Olin Sanders received 981 running fourth in the race.

THE CITY SCHOOLS WILL OPEN MONDAY

Everything Will Be Ready For Opening Day.—Teachers Will Arrive Saturday.—School Books In Stock.—Buildings and Grounds Are In Shape.—Principals Meet Friday.—Corps of Instructors

OTHER ELECTION NEWS.

K. P. Smith, Solicitor of the Tenth Judicial Circuit has been defeated for reelection by Leon W. Harris according to returns reported in Anderson Tribune of this morning. Mr. Harris has defeated both Solicitor Smith and Leon L. Rice, his other opponent.

Anderson County has voted in favor of a rural police system.

John J. McSwain seems to be elected to congress from fourth district, having received a majority of the votes cast over three opponents.

H. P. Fulmer, of Orangeburg has defeated Congressman Ed. C. Mann, of St Matthews for re-election by about 1500 votes. Congressman Mann succeeded Congressman Lever last year.

Proctor A. Bonham has been re-elected to the State Senate from Greenville County by a majority of 800 votes.

In the race for Lieut. Governor Wilson G. Harvey of Charleston, has a lead of about 4,000 votes over Oscar K. Mauldin, of Greenville, and these two will enter a second primary.

General W. W. Moore has been renominated for Adjutant and Inspector General by a large majority.

Frank W. Shealy is leading in the race for Railroad Commissioner with D. L. Smith, of Colleton a close second. There will be a second race for this office with these two candidates opposed to each other.

T. P. Cothran is re-elected to th House from that county.

The Abbeville City Schools will begin the new session Monday, September 6th at 9 a. m. The janitors and their helpers have been busy all week getting the buildings thoroughly cleaned, the windows and boards washed, the floors oiled and the grounds mowed, ready for the bevy of smiling faces which will appear for instruction Monday morning.

In the high school building carpenters have divided the old eighth grade room in two class rooms which will be occupied by the two sections of the seventh grade, this being the first session that this grade has had more than one section. There will be over 45 pupils in this grade which makes the work too heavy for one teacher and the superintendent and board of trustees are alive to the fact that the weakest part of our course of study has been in the sixth and seventh grades and it is their intention that the pupils in these grades have ample teaching force to give them individual instruction and encouragement to continue their school work through the high school. Probably more pupils have "dropped" from school at the end of the seventh grade than at any other time. The school officials feel that provisions for ample teaching force and strong instructors will tend to encourage the young students to continue in school.

Pupils From Other Districts
There will be some room provided for the pupils of other school districts than Abbeville and the superintendent announces that it will be a case of "first come, first served." As soon as each grade is filled to a reasonable capacity the bars will down on all pupils from without the district. The pupils from this school district will naturally be given first place in the question of seats. No room will be permitted to be over-crowded and with an extra teacher for the seventh grade the teachers should each have just about the proper number of pupils to do the best work.

The board of trustees have authorized a tuition change of \$3.00 per month for all grade school pupils from without the district. This fee is invariably payable in advance twice during the session. For each pupil below the eighth grade tuition to the amount of \$12 is payable upon entrance next week and \$15 January 1, 1921. No charge is made for high school pupils from any district in South Carolina.

Vaccination Compulsory
By state legislation no pupil can be admitted to school who has not been successfully vaccinated during the past two years. A certificate from a physician in good standing is required for all new pupils entering school Monday. No records are necessary for any pupil who attended school last session as the records for "old" pupils are already in hand. Just for pupils entering school for the first time are certificates required.

Hours Of Daily Session
The double session will not be inaugurated just now. The first bell will ring at 8:30 a. m., the second at 8:45 at which time all pupils will be on the grounds and will march into their respective rooms, and the last bell will be at 9:00 when actual work will commence. Recesses will be announced Monday in the various grades and the hour of dismissal will be 2:00 p. m. for all grades. All pupils below the sixth grade
