TENNESSEE HOUSE REVERSES ACTION ON SUFFRAGE ISSUE

Motion Carried With a Rush as Antis Gain Control of Floor—Vote Illegal, Ratificationists Declare

Nashville, Aug. 31.—The Tennessee House of Representatives, with a quorum present for the first time since August 20, expunged from its journal this afternoon all record of ratification of the suffrage amendment and voted 47 to 24 with 20 not voting, to non-concur in the action of the Senate in ratifying.

Shortly after the House convened it became evident that the anti-ratificationists, a majority of whom have been in Alabama on a filibuster for more than a week, were in the majority through failure of several of the suffrage members to arrive in time. With clock-like program, the anti's proceeded to put through their plan of attempting to undo what was done on August 21 when ratification was accomplished.

Carried by 47 to 37.

The first step was the motion to expunge from the journal of that day all reference to the proceedings upon the suffrage ratification resolution. After this was accomplished, 47 to 37, with sixteen not voting, motion as made and carried that a certified copy of the resolution, the original of which is in the hands of the Senate, be spread upon the journal. Representative Riddick, floor leader of the ratificationists, made

the point of order that the resolution was out of the hands of the House and now a part of the federal Constitution through proclamation of Secretary of State Colby. He was overruled by Speaker Walker.

The House by a viva voce vote then adopted a motion to reconsider its previous action under the resolution. Motion was then made and carried a non-concur in the action of the Senate in ratifying the ratification resolution.

May Be Illegal

In the course of the discussion of the legality of the action of the House in considering, Representative Riddick read a letter from State's Attorney Thompson in which the latter expressed the opinion that reconsideration of the resolution was impossible, since the House had already ratified it and Governor Cox had certified to Secretary Colby this action by both House and Senate.

Governor Roberts declined to make any statement tonight as to the effect of the House's action, saying that the matter was a purely legal one and in the hands of Attorney General Thompson.

Action of the House is not taken seriously here, as the general opinion prevails that legality or illegality of ratification will be decided up in the record sent to Washington by Governor Roberts.

Anti-ratificationists would not state tonight whether they expect to make an effort to have the Senate, which voted to ratify, 25 to 4, to reverse its action.

WOMEN MAY VOTE IN NOVEMBER ELECTION

Governor Cooper Will This Week Instruct County Registration Boards To Issue Certificates To The Women

Columbia, Aug. 31.—Gov. Cooper stated today that he would this week issue instructions to the chairmen of the county registration boards for the registration of the women when the registration books are opened next Monday. The Governor will act on the interpretation placed upon the effect of the national suffrage amendment by Attorney General Wolfe and also other lawyers in official position in this state and other parts of the nation, to the effect that the amendment to the federal constitution giving women the right to vote simply strikes from other constitutions and statutes the word "male", and makes election restrictions and regulations apply equally to female voters.

Registration books in every county will be open on the first Monday in September. The governor says he will instruct the registration commissions to leave them open long enough for all the women to have a chance to register.
