The famous American soprano will appear in person. Her program consists of "the songs that America loves."

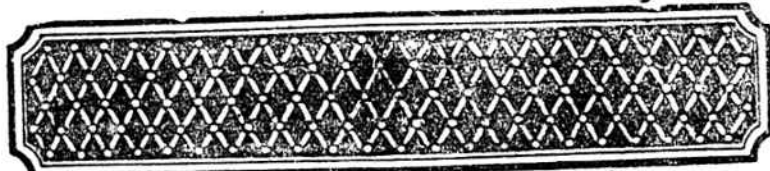
