

MILLERAND CHOSEN FRENCH PRESIDENT

Name Of Premier Only One Formally Presented—Eleventh To Office.

Versailles, Sept. 23.—Alexandre Millerand was today elected president of France by the national assembly in session here. He succeeds Paul Deschanel, who resigned because of ill health.

The complete vote was: Alexandre Millerand, 695. Gustave Delory (Socialist deputy from Lille, department du Nord), 69.

Scattering, 20. Blank, 108.

At 4:57 o'clock M. Millerand was proclaimed by Leon Bourgeois, presiding officer of the senate and chairman of the assembly, as the 11th president of France.

Paris, Sept. 23.—Members of the French senate and chamber of deputies convened in national assembly at Versailles today to elect a president of the republic in succession to Paul Deschanel, whose resignation was read before both houses early this week. The name of Alexandre Millerand, who since last February has been premier and minister of foreign affairs, was the only one to be formally presented, a joint caucus of the two houses held yesterday having shown an almost overwhelming majority for him. In fact, today's meeting was looked upon as merely a formality made necessary by the provisions of the constitution.

Alexandre Millerand has long been one of the most foremost figures in the political life of France, his entry into parliament dating back to 1895, and his cabinet experience to 1889, when he became a member of the Waldeck Rousseau cabinet. His early affiliations were with the radical Socialists, and he always has been keenly interested in labor questions and has fathered

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NORTH CAROLINIAN IN BIG DIAMOND SWINDLE

Washington, Sept. 25.—Patrick Paul Frederick who gave his home address as Wilmington, N. C., was arrested here today in connection with an alleged scheme to obtain diamonds valued at nearly \$20,000. When taken into custody Frederick was at a hotel, registered under the name of Walter D. Denegre, a wealthy resident of New Orleans.

According to a written confession which the police say they have obtained from Frederick, he has operated by ordering diamonds from a number of jewelry concerns throughout the country, using the name of some man of wellknown financial responsibility, and impersonating this man and claiming the jewels when they were delivered.

Frederick entered a plea of guilty when arraigned before a United States commissioner and was remanded to jail upon failure to furnish bail in the sum of \$5,000.

The particular case upon which the hearing was held concerned an alleged attempt September sixth, to obtain diamonds valued at \$7,000 ordered from the George T. Brodnax company, of Memphis, Tenn.

Frederick will be taken to North Carolina for trial as it was from points in that state that the bogus orders for gems are alleged to have been mailed.

Millerand's services to his country during the great war, however, as minister of war in the Viviani cabinet, and his notable conduct of France's policy as successor of Clemenceau in the premiership after "The Tiger's" retirement last January, that raised him into pre-eminent eligibility for the presidency, compelled his reluctant consent to quit the premiership and stand as a candidate to succeed President Deschanel.

M. Millerand was born in Paris, February 10, 1859, and was educated for the bar.

BAKER ASKS ECONOMY

Chiefs Of Bureau Told To Cut To Bone.

Washington, Sept. 26.—All chiefs of bureaus and services in the war department were instructed today by Secretary Baker to observe "the most rigid economy in preparing the estimates for the fiscal year 1922 and to reduce all items to a minimum."

"The house committee on appropriations," the order added, "has requested that all items of general legislation be omitted from the estimates with the suggestion that the same be submitted later to the speaker of the house for reference to the appropriate legislation committee."

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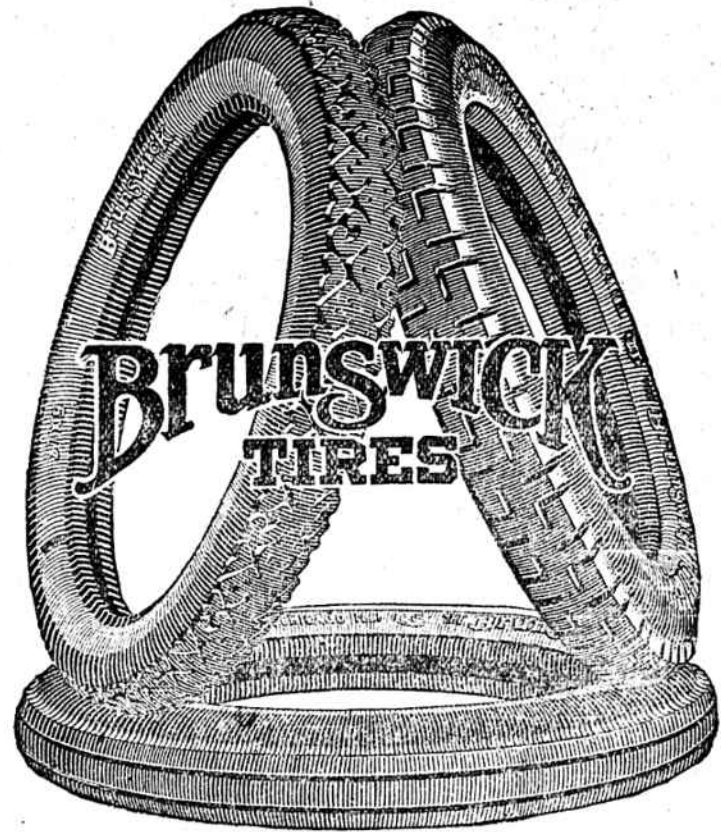
