CONSUMPTION ON COTTON IN MONTH SEPTEMBER

Washington, Oct. 14.—Cotton consumed during September amounted to 457,247 running bales of lint and 37,121 bales of linters, the census bureau announced today.
Consumption in September last year was 491,069 bales of lint and 23,182 of linters.
