MRS. COLEMAN WRITES

Discusses Red Cross Drive and Gives Views on Matters of Interest—Requires Assurance That Red Cross Funds Be Applied To Red Cross Purposes

The Press and Banner is in receipt of the following communication from Mrs. Hannah Hemphill Coleman, which will be read with interest:

Editor Press and Banner:

A notice appearing in the Press and Banner of last Wednesday stated that the Red Cross drive for members would take place Saturday, November 20th, and asked that "those disposed to help a good cause would not be deterred from doing so by the fact that the officers of the Red Cross in Abbeville sometime ago appropriated a large amount of the associations funds for the benefit of a private institution under the assurance that there was no further need for Red Cross funds in Abbeville; I should like to ask you to substitute the word "assurance" for "assurances."

At that time, as Home Service Secretary of the Abbeville Chapter, I "assured" the officers of the chapter that there was a definite need of continued work for the Red Cross and supported the "assurance" with data to that effect. "Assurance" was also given the officers by Miss Annie Doty, Supervisor for South Carolina, by Miss Elizabeth Ellie, special agent for the Southern Division, American Red Cross, and by J. L. McMillan, of Atlanta, Manager of the Southern Division. In spite of these "assurances," the officers "assumed," "took it upon themselves" to say there was no further need of the Red Cross work in Abbeville County.

The officers of the local chapter had a perfect right to close the Home Service office if after a careful and genuine investigation they reached the conclusion that there was no further service possible to the soldiers active and discharged.
