GOVERNOR GRANTS PAROLES TO FOUR

Governor Cooper yesterday granted four paroles.

Z. C. Morris, convicted in Aiken county in September, 1919, before Judge John S. Wilson, of breach of trust with fraudulent intent, was granted a parole during good behavior. He was sentenced to serve two years.

Pierce Sims, convicted before Judge Greene in Spartanburg in April, 1921, of involuntary manslaughter, and sentenced to serve two years, was paroled for one week in order that the federal board for vocational education can make an examination of him, a former soldier.

Harrison E. Sutton, convicted in Darlington before Judge Melver for grand larceny in June, 1920 and sentenced to serve 18 months, was paroled during good behavior.

Eari T. Riggs, convicted in Charleston in February, 1921 before Judge Ernest Moore for grand larceny, and sentenced to serve three months, was paroled during good behavior. Riggs is the man who told Charleston attorneys and detectives that he saw the Creech murder on board a vessel in the harbor months ago, Riggs being on a pier nearby.

U. S. AMMUNITION FOUND IN BERLIN

London, May 26.—American ammunition totalling 16,388 rounds has been captured in the Dublin district since March 26 last, Sir Hamar Greenwood, chief secretary for Ireland, stated in the House of Commons today. The chief secretary made his statement in reply to Col. Martin Archer-Shee, Unionist member of Finsbury who asked him whether ammunition of American manufacture had recently been captured in raids on Sinn Fein premises, in Dublin, and if so, what was the amount and the nature of the captures.

Col. Archer-Shee, in a supplementary question, asked whether in view of the fact that large sums of money had been raised in the United States "for support of the campaign of assassination and anarchy in Ireland," strong representations would be made to the United States government with reference to this fact.

Another member wanted to know how it was that this large amount could come to Ireland and whether Sir Hamar would ask the United States to assist in preventing its so doing. The chief secretary said he noted the importance of these supplementary questions and would confer with the foreign secretary regarding them.

ROTARIANS TO SAIL

New York, May 25.—Two steamships have been chartered to transport 2,000 American and Canadian Rotarians to Edinburgh, Scotland, for the annual convention of the International Association of Rotary Clubs to be held June 13 to 16. Rotarians from Cuba, the Orient and South America also will be in the party, the Rotary club of New York said today. They will sail June 1, Cameroania and Carona.
