Boston, June 16.—Printers are out here from two newspaper offices, and refuse to return to work until their demand for \$1.22 an hour for day work and \$1.29 an hour for night work has been granted.

WHITE MAN HELD FOR OCOONEE MURDER

Waihalla, June 16.—John Swofford, white man, is in the Ocoonee county jail held on a charge of murder in connection with the killing of S. P. Adams. Adams was about 23 years old and unmarried while Swofford is 35 years old and married. The killing occurred in the Unity section of Ocoonee county at Swofford's home on the Tagaloo river Tuesday of last week, nothing being known of the tragedy, however, until Friday when Adams, after being unconscious or semi-conscious three days from a blow on the head, was brought home by Swofford, who the coroner's jury held is responsible for the killing. Adams died at his home Monday afternoon.

MOTION FOR NEW TRIAL REFUSED BY JUDGE SEASE

T. E. Lanford Must Go On Trial For Killing Glenn Foster and Guy McDowell

Spartanburg, June 16.—Judge T. S. Sease in the general sessions court today, overruled a motion for a new trial made by the defendant in the case of T. E. Lanford, indicted for the murder of Guy McDowell and Glenn Foster, taxi drivers who were killed near Camp Wadsworth some months ago while they were alleged to be hunting for contraband whiskey. The motion was made when it was found that a material witness could not be present because of sickness. The state, however, agreed to accept as testimony what the witness would testify if present.

It is alleged that the two men who were killed made a practice of impersonating officers and seizing whiskey and appropriating it to their own use, or going where whiskey was hid in the bushes and stealing it, and it was while they were hunting for booze that they were killed. They are alleged to have gone off in a car similar to Lanford's and were never seen alive after that. One was found in a woods just out of town, and the other about a mile from there in a branch. Both were shot through the head.

Lanford has been in jail since the crime, never having applied for bail. It is alleged that his defense will be an alibi. It is expected that the court house will be filled to capacity during the trial.

COBB FIGHTS FIRE

New York Evening Post. Irvin Cobb, writer, had to call in the Independent Volunteer Hose Company for Ossining last night, when an attempt to fight a fire in his barn at Yorktown single handed failed. There was some delay in reaching the Cobb estate and the firemen from Ossining found the barn a total loss.

While waiting for the fire apparatus, Mr. Cobb was able to carry some of his farm tools out of the burning building. The flames consumed several vehicles and a quantity of hay and feed. The total loss was \$15,000.
