**"SERPENT TOMB" NO MYSTERY**

Savannah, Ga.—There is no longer any mystery about the "serpent tomb" in Conial cemetery that has figured in tales of early Savannah life of more than a century. The mystery was solved recently when the name of the person to whom it was erected was inscribed on the marble. It rests over the body of a kinsman of Theodore Roosevelt.

The inscription just placed on the monument says: "Archibald Bulloch first president of Georgia, 1761. Born in South Carolina, 1730; died in Savannah, 1777. Patriot, soldier, statesman. Georgians, let the memory of Archibald Bulloch live in your breasts. Tell your children of him and let others tell another generation."

Miss Emma Bulloch, of Washington, D. C., great-great-granddaughter of Archibal Bulloch, came to Savannah and had the inscription inserted.

Archibald Bulloch was the great-grand-father of Mittie Bulloch the mother of Theodore Roosevelt.

The tomb with its encircling snakes, typifying eternity, has aroused the keenest interest for generations, and many fanciful legends have been related as to its origin and the identity of him who rests under the stone. Miss Bulloch says there has never been any mystery in her family about the tomb.

**DENTIST GETS SENTENCE**

Charleston, June 20.—In federal court today, Judge H. A. M. Smith sentenced Dr. M. A. Woods, dentist of Columbia, convicted of violating the narcotic act, to \$1,000 fine, with costs and 18 months in the federal prison at Atlanta.

Counsel for the defendant gave notice of appeal, and Dr. Woods was released under bond of \$5,000, pending the outcome of the appeal. Dr. Woods was found guilty several days ago, and a motion for a new trial was refused by Judge Smith, who announced he would impose sentence today. The defendant was charged with selling cocaine to two addicts under four counts. Judge Smith has adjourned the June term.
