INDUSTRY BOOMING

Automobile Business Rapidly Returning to Normal.

New York, Aug. 23 .- The automobile industry, following a brief period of depression, is booming again.

Continued increase in the demand for motor transportation is accepted as an "index to the return of industry generally to sound conditions," John C. Long, secretary of the educational department of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce,
