LIVESTOCK SPECIALISTS

Clemson College, Aug. 26.—Director W. W. Long announces the appointment of two new livestock specialists for the Extension Service, both of whom will give attention to swine work. Mr. Sims is a graduate of Purdue University, where he had special training in livestock work, and has recently been manager of a livestock farm in South Indiana. BRIDE'S HEAD BUMPED AGAINST BRIDEGROOM'S

(From the Detroit News) On the wedding day in Borneo, the bride and bride-groom are brought from opposite ends of the village to the spot where the ceremony is to be performed. They are made to sit on two bars of iron, that blessings as lasting and health as vigorous may attend the pair. A cigar and betel leaf, prepared with the areca nut, are next put into the hands of the bride and bride-groom. One of the priests then waves two fowls over the heads of the couple, and in a long address to the Supreme Being calls down blessings upon the pair and implores that peace and happiness may attend the union. After the heads of the affianced have been knocked against each other three or four times, the bride-groom puts the prepared betel leaf and cigar into the mouth of the bride, while she does the same for him, whom she thus acknowledges as her husband.

DECISION REJECTED Labor Board Rule Suggested Change Unjustified.

Chicago, Aug. 26.—Rules governing the payment of over-time rates, promulgated by the United States Railroad Labor Board last week to supplant the overtime rules of the national agreement covering shop-crafts employees, were rejected as "unjustified" by a conference of regional executive boards of the railway employes department of the American Federation of Labor today.

A letter was sent today to all locals, conveying the results of a three day conference just concluded. "By no conceivable line of reasoning," the letter said, "can decision 222 (the labor board's rules decision) be justified and this body declines to accept it." All union members were warned, however, to remain at work until further official action is taken by union officials. The letter advised that it was considered best to wait until the labor board had issued substitute rules for the entire national agreement before taking a referendum vote on the matter.

Meanwhile, however, the letter advised the men "in time of peace, to prepare for war." The seven rules announced by the board last week cover payments for overtime, Sunday and holidays. A number of radical changes were made and labor leaders declared the new rules would materially affect the earnings of shop employees. A. O. Wharton, labor member of the board, and former president of the railway employes department, American Federation of Labor, published a long dissenting opinion, in which he refused to sanction the majority decision.

WOMAN CHOOSES HUSBAND KILLED BY MAN REJECTED

Alexander Meets Mrs. Bachman and Asks Whether She Prefers Husband to Him.

Portersville, Cal., Aug. 22.—Mrs. J. B. Bachman, forced to choose between her husband and another man in the presence of both elected to remain true to her marriage, and thus sealed her death, which came an instant later when the other man, Walter H. Alexander, it is charged, shot and killed her yesterday. "Well, what are you going to do?" Alexander was quoted as demanding of Mrs. Bachman. "I guess I'll stay here," Bachman said his wife replied from her seat beside him in an automobile.

Thereupon, Bachman says, Alexander fired a shotgun point-blank at the woman. The shooting occurred at the ranch home of H. B. Collings, step-father of Alexander, in the Poplar district, near here. Alexander's mother and stepfather also witnessed the shooting. After the shooting, Alexander left, carrying the shotgun, it was said, and a sheriff's posse is searching for him. According to the story Bachman told officers he had gone to Lindsay, 20 miles from the Collings ranch, to bring home Mrs. Bachman. He found Alexander also at Lindsay, he said, and was forced by him to drive Mrs. Bachman and Alexander to the ranch. He told officers Alexander held a knife at his back all the way. At the ranch, Alexander disabled the automobile, obtained a shotgun and approached Mrs. Bachman, the woman's husband said. After holding Bachman at bay with the shotgun half an hour, while Collings procured liquor from a neighbor's house, Alexander fled across the fields, the two men told officers.

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Alexander Kills Self.

Porterville, Cal., Aug. 22.—Walter H. Alexander, who, according to J. B. Bachman a rancher near here shot and killed Mrs. Bachman yesterday when she refused to leave her husband and go with Alexander was found dying on a ranch ten miles from here by a posse today. Alexander died before any aid could be administered. Sheriff Curt Smith, leader of the posse, believed Alexander poisoned himself.
