WILSON'S HEALTH CLOSELY WATCHED

Washington, Nov. 1.—Former President Wilson appeared today to be making a good recovery from an attack of indigestion and severe headaches, which has kept him in his bed for the last few days, his physician, Rear Admiral Cary T. Grayson, said today.

After an early call at the Wilson home, Admiral Grayson said the ex-president probably would be able to sit up considerably today. He expects him to be able to resume his usual routine tomorrow.

The former president, Dr. Grayson indicated, probably will be able to keep an appointment scheduled for tomorrow.

While Mr. Wilson's present illness is not regarded as extremely serious by his physician, his general condition is such that he requires most careful attention and care. Ever since he began to make a general recovery from the stroke which two years ago affected one arm and made his walking difficult, the ex-president has been subject to attacks of indigestion and severe headaches.

SCOTT DILLINGHAM IS IN GERMAN CAPITAL

GEORGETOWN TO CONFER DEGREE ON FRENCHMAN

Washington, Nov. 1.—Marshal Foch, on his return to Washington for the Armistice Day ceremonies will receive from Georgetown University the honorary degree of Doc-

tor of Cannons and Civil laws, John B. Creeden president of the University announced today. The Marshal also will be presented a sword as a gift from all of the Jesuit institutions of America, the French military leader being a graduate of the Jesuit College of St. Clements at Metz. His brother is a member of the order.

Ceremonies incident to the conferring of the degree and presentation of the sword will be attended by high government officials the Ambassadors of Allied powers and official delegates of the Jesuit order including notable Catholic prelates.
