WOMEN'S CLOTHING

WILL BE CHEAPER

Prices Expected to Decline Shortly Next Spring Under The New System.

New York, Nov. 5.—Prices of women's clothing next spring will be 25 to 33 1-3 per cent lower than last spring through immediate return to piece work in the garment making trades, said a statement today by the Cloak, Suit and Skirt Manufacturers' Protective association. Their proposal to abandon the present weekly wage and restore the piece work payments is opposed by the International Ladies' Garment Workers' union, the members of which are preparing to take a strike referendum.

The manufacturers' statement declared the forecasted reductions answered "charges by Benjamin Schlesinger, head of the union, that the manufacturers' aim is to hit the buying public by increasing prices by a return to a piece basis."

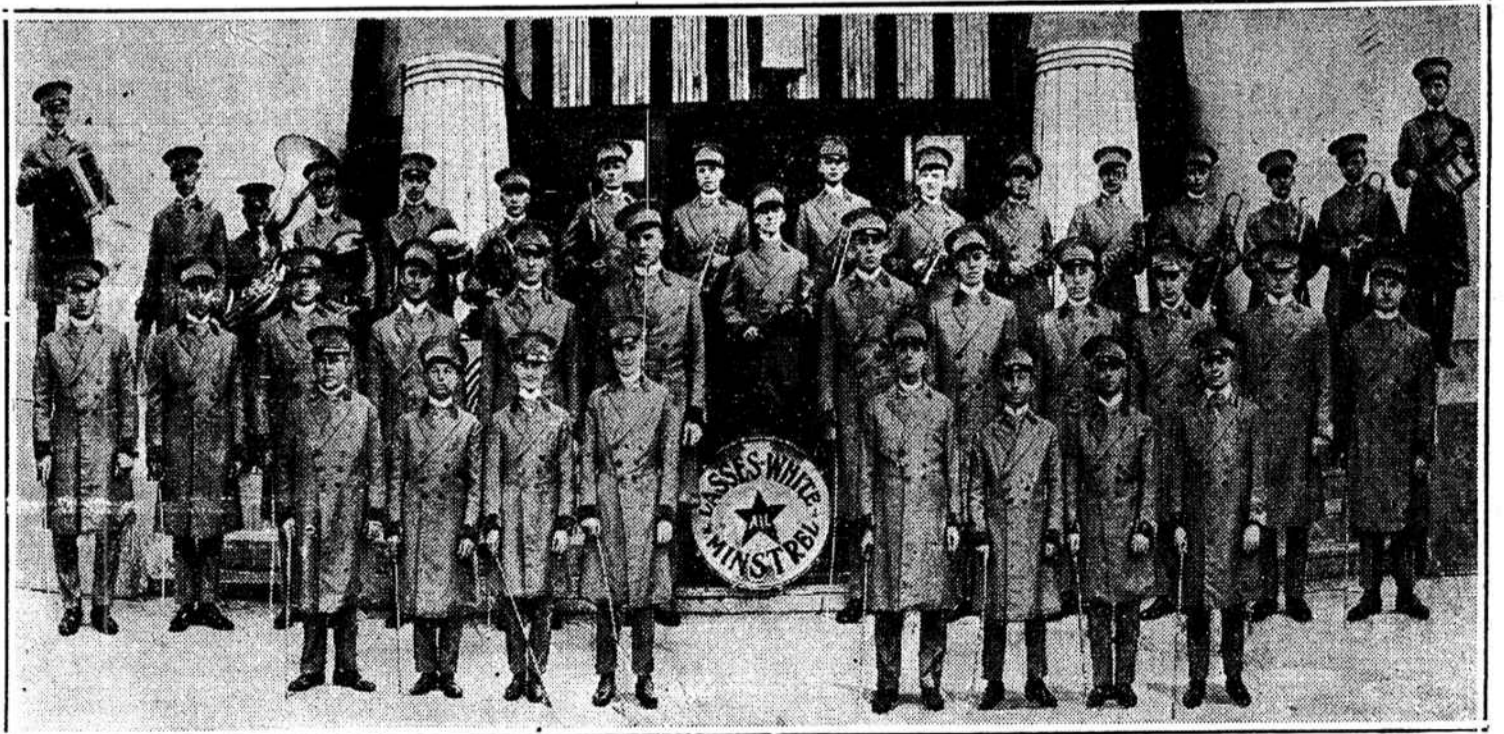
