For the second session of each court the judges will preside over the courts in the circuits in which they live. For the third session the judges will preside as follows:

The successful bidders were the Carolina Supply company of Charlotte, the Southern School Supply company of Raleigh and the E. H. Sheldon company of Muskeegan, Wis. Delivery is to be made February 1.

In letters yesterday's record also surpassed that of the same day a year ago. Yesterday the number handled was 4,749,741.

FRENCH ARMY TOTAL

Figures Given for Next May by Authority will be 673,000

Paris, Dec. 22.—France's total army strength of white and colored troops will be 673,000 after May, 1922, according to a statement made today by General De Castelnau, former chief of the general staff, to the Associated Press.

General De Castelnau, who is president of the army commission of the chamber of deputies, set at rest the conflicting estimates of the French forces by explaining that the budget of 1922 carries appropriations sufficient for only 636,000 men and as the army will be below that figure between the first release of men of the class of 1920 and the first incorporation into the army of men of the class of 1922, there will be enough of a saving in revenue to support the larger number of men later on.
