19 YEAR SEARCH FOR MISSING MAN

Advertisement Finally Located Bernard Freeman in New York

Chicago, March 4.—A 19 year search for a missing man, which covered Europe, Asia, and Australia and twice crossed the Atlantic into America was ended today when Mrs. Ida Shapire of Chicago was notified that her cousin, Bernard Friedman, has been located in New York. Friedman, when 12 years old, wandered away from his home in Lund, Sweden, according to Mrs. Shapire. His parents spent much money in an effort to trace him out after several years of unsuccessful search they died of grief. Mrs. Shapire took up the search. She followed the trail through Europe into Asia and then to Australia. Ten years ago she came to America and settled in Chicago but still continued the search. An advertisement in a New York newspaper finally led Friedman to a younger sister there and the Shapires were notified. Friedman is expected to arrive in Chicago within a few days.

Washington, March 5.—The \$300,000 free seed item, carried for years in the agricultural bill, has been dropped off by the appropriations committee, which will report the department of agricultural measure for next year to the House Monday.

With the new fight to cut down public expenditures, members of the committee said today it was extremely doubtful if Senators and Representatives would be able in future to contribute their bit to the gardens and flower beds of their constituents as they have in the past.
