IRISH LEADERS REACH AGREEMENT

NORTHERN AND SOUTHERN GOVERNMENTS MEET IN LONDON—IMPORTANT STEP TAKEN FOR PEACE—AGREEMENT FOUND IN SHORT TIME

London, March 30.—Winston Churchill, the imperial secretary for the colonies, announced tonight in the house of commons the terms of the most important agreement yet reached between the representatives of the northern and southern governments in Ireland for bringing about peace in the strife torn country.

The agreement, which was reached with unexpected expedition at the conference between delegates of the Irish groups and representatives of the imperial government, far transcends in importance the pact arrived at between Michael Collins, head of the provisional government, and Sir James Craig, the Ulster premier, at an earlier stage in the negotiations.

It provides for the reorganization of the police in Ulster on a basis satisfactory to the religious leanings of the people of the north and the south; for trial of persons charged with serious offenses by a special court composed of the highest justices; for general cooperation between the north and the south of a most promising character and for assistance from the British parliament to remedy the unemployment difficulties in Belfast, which rendered the carrying out of the previous Craig-Collins pact almost impossible. The fact that the representatives of the Dublin, Belfast and imperial governments set their signatures to such an agreement as is regarded in political circles as the most significant and weighty happening since the Irish treaty was signed. The conference sat throughout the whole of the day, but there always was a most hopeful and cheerful spirit manifested by all those participating in it.

LOST MONEY ON SHIPS

Canadian Government Millions In The Hole

Ottawa, Ont., March 30.—The Canadian government lost \$2,210,724 in operating its merchant marine in 1921, excluding depreciation and interest charges. Interest owed the government for 1921 was \$3,357,833. Depreciation was figured at \$4,158,775 for the year.

This information was given to the House of Commons today by two members. Average costs for the smallest or 2,800-ton type vessels while not in operation was given as \$163.12 a day while the average was placed at \$572.87 for the largest or 10,500-ton type.

LAST SOLDIER DEAD COME FROM FRANCE

One Thousand and Sixty Saluted By Guns of New York Forts

New York, March 30.—The last battalion of soldier dead to be brought home from the fields of France—1060 in all—were saluted by the guns of Forts Hamilton and Wadsworth when the army transport Cambria passed through the Narrows this afternoon with her precious cargo. Flags of escorting craft flew at half mast and were dipped in salute to the fallen warriors.

Forty-five thousand of those who made the supreme sacrifice overseas in the service of the United States have now been brought back to their homeland, and only about 100 more bodies await shipment from England and France. All of the others who fell in battle or died behind the lines will continue to rest in foreign soil, that being the wish of their relatives.

Commemoration ceremonies for those who died in uniform will be conducted in Brooklyn, where the Cambria docked today. General Pershing is to lead a parade organized by war veterans.

In the procession will be high naval and military officers, groups of senators and congressmen, Mayor Hylan and leaders in civil life.
