LAW REQUIRES GIRLS SIX MILLION PEOPLE **WORK WITHOUT PAY**

PEASANT PREMIER OF BUL-GARIA ADVOCATES ARREST AND PUNISHMENT OF GIRLS WHO REFUSE TO COMPLY. VERY FEW COMPLY

Sofia, Bulgaria, June 1 .- Premier Stamboulisky advocates the arrest and punishment of girls who refuse to obey the new law requiring them to work for the government free four months out of each year. Under this law girls between the ages of 16 and 20, daughters of bourgeois citizens of Varna and Sofia, are required to work but only one hunared have thus far complied, and they are doing sewing, typing and Bospital work. The law went into effect May 1.

Those who have refused to obey argue that they are either under or above the stipulated ages, or that they are about to be married, which is one of the excuses allowed. Those who comply belong to some of the wealthiest families and their moth_ ers accompany them to their work, remaining throughout the eight hours demanded of their daughters. the bowls of the entire family would The law is typical of the rule of not fill a full tablespoon. Thousands of visitors are now in Sofia for the peasants congress and the bourgeeisie is perturbed by rumors as to the result.

Members of the bourgeois party, fearing the imminence of a peasant dictatorship, are attempting to export their valuables and many have been caught and jailed.
