OF WAR DEAD ARRIVED TODAY

York, June 8.—Sixty four caskets bearing the last of America's war dead to be shipped home from France by rail were lifted over the side of the transport, Somme, today and upon an army pier in Brookings. Services will be held on Sunday and the bodies will be sent

to relatives for final burial. All of the other thousands of American dead overseas will remain there.

The Somme also brought home 376 of the officers and men who have been stationed along the Rhine. Fifty wives of officers were aboard and eighty four members of enlisted men's families.
