**SUMMARY OF WORK FOR AUG.**

**Done By County Agent C. Lee Gowan.—Meeting the People.**

The primary aim of the past month's work has been to meet the people and to study the native resources, physical and moral. It has been our purpose to gain fundamental knowledge of the developed and undeveloped resources, both physical and moral, in order that we may know what we may count upon for community development, community pride and that finer and wider community life which must come, if it comes at all, out of the still unknown resources of the county.

We have made ten visits to farmers in response to calls, 43 visits to farmers without any call, travelled 398 miles on official business, wrote 45 letters, received 109 letters and have had 175 farmers to call upon us either at the office or outside. We secured plans for a four thousand bushel capacity sweet potato storage house, attended ten public gatherings for the purpose of learning the people and made one speech.

Six meetings have been arranged for during the next two weeks for the purpose of studying the fundamental principles of PLANT FEEDING and the growing of FORAGE CROPS.

We find in the county some of the best Jersey blood that the country affords which if developed and advertised within itself would bring thousands of dollars into the county. There is a very successful bull association in the county serving a great need in developing a better class of grade and some purebred cattle but there are a few small herds of quality animals here that should be given a chance to show their colors.

**COAL CAR LOADINGS JUMP TO 30,000 CARS TUESDAY**

Washington, Aug. 31.—Coal loadings throughout the country yesterday jumped to 30,054 cars, or 7,876 cars more than the highest previous daily total since the coal strike began in April, according to figures made public today by the Association of Railway Executives. Association officials said the record made on the first day of the week gave promise of a weekly loading of around 10,000,000 tons as compared with about 6,500,000 tons last week.

**ONLY 13 OUT OF 322 LIVES WERE SAVED**

When the Itata Sunk Off the Coast of Chile When Caught in Severe Gale.

Santiago, Chile, Aug. 31.—Latest wireless reports from the cruiser Chacabuco are to the effect that only thirteen persons of the 322 aboard the steamship Itata were rescued when the vessel sank off Coquimbo yesterday. The cruiser is rushing the survivors to Coquimbo where crowds line the Mole awaiting their arrival.

It is understood the Itata was an old vessel, recently repaired and that she was carrying a large number of laborers and their families to the nitrate plants of Chuquicamata. The other passengers were traders. The account from the Chacabuco says the Itata was caught in a severe gale at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon and was capsized by the heavy seas due to her overloaded condition. The vessel went down in five minutes.
