MONEY SHORTAGE STOPS SPARTAN BRIDGE WORK

Spartanburg, Oct. 31.—It was announced here today that work would have to be suspended on ten or fifteen bridges in Spartanburg county because the supervisor cannot secure appropriations needed to carry on construction. Supervisor Vernon, on Saturday asked the legislative delegation for \$16,000 to be expended on bridges, but the delegation members expressed the opinion that it would not be possible for them to promise such appropriation until after the state and county elections.

GOVERNOR HARVEY TO REVIEW ANOTHER PARDON

Columbia Oct. 31.—Revocation by Governor Harvey of the parole of Grover Crooks, of Oconee county, will be reviewed by the state supreme court Wednesday, Associate Justice Watts today issued a writ of habeas corpus directing Superintendent Sanders of the state prison to produce Crooks in court on Wednesday. This is the second instance of revocation of a parole being attacked in court, Judge Prince at Anderson last week having ordered the release of Reed Shaw.

CARNIVAL SPECIAL HIT BY EXPRESS TRAIN

Three Are Dead From Rear End Collision Near A Louisiana Town Today.

New Orleans, Oct. 31.—Three dead, four seriously injured and two slightly hurt was the human toll taken in the rear-end railroad wreck early today when the fast Sunset express, New Orleans-San Francisco, Southern Pacific passenger No. 109 tore into the Wortham Carnival Shows special 35 car train en route from New Orleans to New Iberia, La. The dead are:
Homer V Jones, Will C. Jones, brothers, and R. L. Metcalf, circus employees. The conductor and brakeman of the train were reported missing.

The injured were also members of the circus. Those on the passenger train escaped injury.

The wreck occurred near Adeline, La., between Franklin and New Iberia. Both trains were proceeding westward on a portion of the road that is double-tracked.

The locomotive of the passenger train plowed through two sleepers on the rear end of the circus train, before it was brought to a standstill. The dead and injured were taken to Patterson, La.

First reports indicated the Sella-Floto Circus social train was involved, as that train was moving on tracks in that locality.
