Miscellaneous.

Effects of Laughter on the Circulation of the Blood .- The deep inspirations and the short and frequent expirations made in the act of laughing, have a direct influence on the heart, increasing the quantity of blood within its cavities, in the same manner as the quantity within these is increased by muscular contractions. This condition of the heart, as might be anticipated, will vary in proportion to the violence and duration of the paroxysms of laughter; when these are moderate, the mind is only exhibarated. or, to use a common expression, "the heart becomes joyful;" but if laughing be in-creased or prolonged beyond certain limits, a series of effects more or less injurious frequently supervene. Pain in the cardaic region and headache then come on; and if the paroxysm be immoderate, the quantity of blood propelled into the brain is such that blood propelled into the brain is such that said declaration within a year and a day, from the intellectual powers become greatly excited, and sometimes to such a degree as to given against him. cause their temporary aberration. Even convulsions follow immoderate fits of laughter, and I have known death take place from excessive fits of laughter caused by titilation. A disturbed action of the heart is usually observed in those affected with Mysterics, which may account for the par-oxysm of laughter, the risus sardonicus, biccup, and all the more remarkable phenomena which are characteristic of that disease. Laughter, indeed, greatly disturbs a heart already irritable. This was strikingly exemplified in a person who had a disease of the heart, and who could not indulge in laughing without the increased action of the heart by which it was accompanied, always eausing violent beadache .-- Wardrop on Diseases of the Heart.

POST DILUVIAN LONGEVITY. Passing over the ages of the Antedilu vians, which the Bible proves were of far greater periods than our own, we will come down to times of authenicated history, and will notice a few cases of great longevity. Thomas Parr, as recorded by Lord Francis Bacon, was born in 1483, and died in 1636, aged 152 years. He died not from the disease or decay of a single organ, but from Plethora, caused by more than usual indulgence in eating and drinking. His body was examined by the celebrated Harvey the discoverer of the circulation of the blood, whom we have before mentioned, and who has left an account of the examination .-Parr enjoyed good health for a century and a half. Thirty-five years after the death of Parr, Henry Jenkins, of Yorkshire, England, died, aged 169 years. He was born in 1501, and died in 1670; his age is fully authenticated, and is the gratest among the moderns. John Effingham, of Cornwall England, died in 1757, aged 147 years .-Margaret Foster, of Cumberland, England, died in 1771, aged 136 years.—James Lawrence, a Scotchman, lived 140 years. In 1772, a man named Drakenburg, died in Denmark, in the 147th year of his age. Thirty-six years ago, a man named Joseph Surrington, died at Bergen, in Norway, age 140 years. In 1826, a man named Henry Francisco, died at Whitehall, in the State of New York, nged 134 years. He beat the drum at the coronation of Queen Anne, and was then 16 years of age. He died not by decay of his powers, but a fever. Ju 1825, Edgefield C.H April 3, 1837

Pope Leo XII. granted to a poor man, living near Lake Thrasimene in Italy, a pension, on account of his great age; he was then 125 year old; he died aged 130 years. In 1830, a man died at St. Petersburg, aged 130 years. Through the medium of the records of the Russian Greek Church, we learn the death of a man in Russia, in 1831 aged 165 years. About three years since, a woman died in Tennessee, aged 154 years, -We could add many more to this list, but forbear. Those we have mentioned are drawn from records that do not admit of a doubt, & prove to us most conclusively, that our lives may be prolonged much beyond the present ordinary term .- Dr. Fitch.

I consider all fevers of an intermittent character which cool off once in twenty-foar hours, whether preceded by a chill or not; or whether the fever and chill rise and continue together; or if there be no chill at all. Sometimes fever of this character continues 24 or 48 hours without intermission, and sometimes it occurs only every third day. Nine tenths of the fevers of this state, and most other states of this union, partake more or less of this character; and in all their various appearances the treatment should be the same. pearances the treatment should be the same.

It may be well to observe that Typhus fever is most common in the winter and spring, and Billions fever in the summer and fall. In the first stage of all fevers, it is common for the tongue to be covered with a whitish coat, and if the fever is not broken and runs into the second stage, it is apt to assume a yellowish brown cofor, and in the third and last stage of fevers. Cond. asstroplasts if the many conditions are stages of fevers. fevers, (and particularly if they are of a high grade and malignant character) the tongue is apt grade and malignant character) the tongue is apt to assume a dark brown color, of different degrees of moisture; sometimes it is exceedingly dry; in this stage of the disease the patient is often sen-sible of a hot or burning sensation in the stomach. The symptoms of these two diseases are so much alike in their first-stage that physicians often dif-fer as to their real character, nor does it matter materially, because the treatment of both should be nextly much the same, with this assention oe p etty much the same, with this exception, that typhus fever does not require nor will it bear as much strong sickening medicine as bil-

ous fever. Treatment In the first stage of the two last Tradiment. In the first stage of the two fast diseases, I give a puke or or or two small doses of calomel or some other medicine that will operate upon the stonneh and hawels. Under any circumstances I object to giving more strong medicine, and am decidedly of opinion that respected doses of such operating medicines do medicine, and an declaredly of opinion that re-peated doses of such operating medicines do more barm than good. After this operating on the stomach and bowels (and even without it) if several days have clapsed and my patient beif several days have clapsed and my patient be-come weak. I commence with the pills and drops, and give a dose every three hours, that is eight doses in each twenty four hours, with a regular use of Virginia snake-root, or some other sweat-ing tea, such as hysne sage or haim. Should the patient suffer much with pain in the head, back or elsewhere, give twenty or twenty-five drops of landamm at night, if it be a grown per-son (children should take less corresponding with son (children should take less corresponding with their ages) and should he become much debilita-ted from a continuation of the disease, and par-ticularly if the hands and feet become cold, give a draught of toddy or wine every three or four hours until he recovers; continue all the time to use the pills or drops as recommended. The diet should be light, and taken only a little at a ime and often.

Bleeding is so seldom required in these disea-

es that it is scarcely necessary to beention it; if t ever is resorted to it should be in the early

tage of them.

Blistering is sometimes useful and rarely if ey er injurious; but it should be chiefly resorted to in the last stage, when there is defirium or lasting in the last stage, when there is delirium or lasting coldness in the extremities. In the treatment of either of these diseases, I would prefer the bowels to be in rather a costive than laxative condition. But should the bowels be too inactive, give broken doses of salts or oil, or open them with injections, and if they should be two laxative, give six or eight drops of landamm two, three or four times a day, until the bosness is restrained. My experience in the treatment of yellow fever has not been very extensive, but it is neither more nor less than the highest grade of bilious fever, and should be treated pretty much in the same way.
