Whether thus rolled into sheets, or laid upon cloth, it can be orna-Whether thus rolled into mented with gold or silver leaf, bronze or any coloring matter, or embossed, and made into the most beautiful fabrics for table or piano cloths, shoes, dresses, book-binding, or any thing to which paper, or cloth, or leather can be applied.

For several years past, our best chemists, and Professor Silliman among them, have been endeavoring to discover a process for removing odor, color, and adhesiveness from gum elastic; these being the three principal objections to the ordinary Ladia cloth. Goodyear has not only gained these three points, but still more important: for he has deprived it of expansion and contraction, and alteration in degrees of softness, by variation of temperature; the great objection against common India rubber cloth for cordage, firemens' dresses and shoes. 
