LICENSE LAW.—"The Ark."—At the present session of the Supreme Judicial Court in this city, evidence was brought before the grand jury to obtain an indictment for a violation of the license law. It appeared that some person or persons had obtained a raft or scow, erected a shanty thereon, and moored the same in the Pawtucket River, where it was regularly furnished with "great variety of choice liquors." Attached to the scow was a platform which, when lowered, enabled persons from the shore to walk to the ark, as the float was designated, and the vessel was moored so that this platform could be used on either side of the river, as profit or policy might dictate. On gaining it, there could be seen gauges variously marked, R. G. B. &c., from either of which, on being turned, gushed forth the beverage, its moods represented. This place of resort became very soon as popular as any watering place in the country, as its glasses were always ready, although no attendants were in hand. Those who partook of the refreshing sponge, a matter of course, left something as satisfaction for trouble, which by some ledger demand we could not comprehend, and therefore cannot describe, was taken possession of by some spirit unseeded and unknown.

As the dividing line between Rhode Island and Massachusetts is at high water mark on the east side of the river, it will be perceived that customers from our sister state, by their platform being placed on their side, could be accommodated without violation to the Massachusetts laws. Not so, however, with the laws of Rhode Island: Against these laws there was an offence committed, but establishing the identity of the offender was a very difficult matter. Witnesses in abundance were produced, who testified they had drunk deep of the waters of the ark, but whom they claimed them of, they had neither desire or ability to say.

One person in Providence testified that he furnished from twenty-five to one hundred dollars worth of liquor per week that he charged to "the ark"—that he delivered it sometimes to one and sometimes to another, who were employed to do chores—and finally he identified one person who had at one time received it, against whom the jury returned a true bill, and whose trial will take place at the present term of the court.

It is surmised that, as none of the brood were preserved in the anchor, it was from this modern ark came the "striped pig," which has so recently been annoying the natives of Boston.—*Providence Jour.*

A very spirited excitement is now prevailing in Massachusetts, and R. Island; it seems that the Legislatures of these States at the last Session passed a law forbidding the good people to drink any kind of liquor, or wine, in less quantities

than 15 gallons, or what is the same, to bidding its sale without a license. In less quantities, the sovereign voters are, however, determined not to submit to such wholesale guzzling, wishing, most probably to take it in smaller and more temperate allowances; they are moving every thing to have the law repealed at the next Session, so that they may buy and drink just as little as they please.

Western Carolinian.

"Not less than four 'striped Pigs'" were brought before Mr. Justice Wells last week, and fined for violating the laws of the Commonwealth. One of these "poor shoots" has been shut up in the County "pig pen."—*Northampton Courier.*

"Striped Pig Party" is the name now applied in Massachusetts, to those who are opposed to the "15 gallon" licence law of the State.

THE humble petition of James Harper and his associates, residing in Augusta, Georgia, respectfully shows unto our Honorable bodies that under a charter from the State of Georgia, they have commenced the erection of a Bridge over the Savannah River at the opposite end of the city of Augusta, and about one mile above the town of Hamburg, in South Carolina, that within ten miles of the site just mentioned, are the Ferry of W.
