The rates of Board and Tuition will be fixed

Students will be required to labor two and a half hours in each day, for which they will re-seive reasonable compensation; to be deducted from their board in the last session. Parent or guardians may have their sons prepared either for the Junior or lower classes in College, or have their instructions suited to a high order of

English education. The Principal has resolved to enforce strict discipline; and cultivate the moral as well as the intellectual powers of the youth committed to his care. His efforts in this way will be se onded by the Executive committee, who are de termined to take every practical measure to re-move temptations, as far as possible from this Institution, which are calculated to lead the sta dents into immoralities or disorder. The constitution and laws of this intitution wil he furnished to any one who will apply to either of the members of the Board of Trustees. It is carnestly requested, that the parents and guar-idans who send to this institution, would strictly observe that law of the Board of Trustees, which requires that all monies sent for the use sons should be placed in the hands of the steward, to be given out as necessary; and not to authorise any student to contract at debt, without the approbation of the steward, In order to enforce this law, it is hoped parents and guardians, will refuse the payment o any account contracted by minors (without such au thority;) especially for wine or spirits &c. 

2dly. Of Billions Feeer. This is a more obsti-nate and dangerous disease than intermittent or ague and fever, there are generally three or four dips indisposition previous to the onset of this disease, and frequently chilly sensations for a day or two after. When this di case is properly formed it rarely yields to any treatment under 8 or 10 days, and sometimes much longer.

3dly. Of Typhus or Nercous Fever. This is stid a much more obstina e and dangerous disease than bilious fever, and apparently more mid in the commencement. It often continues tiftee or twenty days with scarcely any remission or in-termission, with great prostration of body and depression of mind. It may be well to observe that Typhus fever is most common in the winter and spring, and Billions fever in the summer an-fall. In the first stage of all fevers, it is common for the tongue to be covered with a whitish coat and if the fever is not broken and runs it to the second stage, it is apt to assume a yellow is brown color, and in the third and last stage o fevers, (and particularly if they are of a high grade and malignant character) the tongue is apt to assume a dark brown color, of different degrees is exceedingly dry: this stage of the disease the patient is often sen sible of a hot or burning sensation in the stomach The symptoms of these two diseases are so much alike in their first stage that physicians often diffor as to their real character, nor does it matter materially, because the treatment of both should that typhus fever does not require nor will it bear as much strong sickening medicine as bil-

Treatment In the first stage of the two last diseases, give a puke or one or two small doses of calomel or some ofter medicine that will operate upon the stomach and bowels. Under any cir umstances I ob ect to giving more strong medicine, and am decidedly of opinion that repeated doses of such operating medicines do more harm than good. After this operating on the stomach and howers (and even without it) if several days have e apsed and my patient become weak, I commence with the pil come weak, I commence with the piles and drops, and give a dose every three hours, that is eight doses in each twenty four hours, with a regular use of Virginia snake-root, or some other sweating tea, such as hysup sage or balm. Should the patient suffer much with pain in the head, the patient suffer much with pain in the head, back or elsewhere, give twenty or twenty-five drops of landamin at night, if it be a grown person (children should take less corresponding with their ages) and should be become much debilitated from a continuation of the disease, and particularly if the hands and feet become cold, give a shaubt of taddy or wine every three or four draught of toddy or wine every three or four hours until he recovers; continue all the time to use the pills or drops as recommended. The diet should be light, and taken only a little at a time and often.

Bleeding is so seldom required in these diseases that it is scarcely necessary to mention it; if it ever is resorted to it should be in the early stage of them.

Blistering is sometimes useful and rarely if ever injurious; but it should be chiefly resorted to er injurious; but it snould be chiefly resorted to in the last stage, when there is delirium or lasting coldness in the extremities. In the frea ment of either of these diseases, I would prefer the bow-els to be in rather a costive than laxative condition. But should the bowels be too inactive, give broken doses of salts or oil, or open them with injections, and if they should be two laxative, give six or eight drops of landanum two. three or four times a day, until the loosness restrained. My experience in the treatment of yellow fever has not been very extensive, but it is neither more nor less than the highest grade of bilious fever, and should be treated pretty much in the same way.
