BANK OF PENN STLVAND. - The Banks in this and other Souther cities should decline to receive he Notes of the United States Bank of Pennsylvania, in payment or on deposit.— This is the only mode of checking the cirulation of the paper of this institution, thich will employ its credit to supplant the local currencies whenever it can introduce its promises to pay. Our Banking instituons have paid bonuses to the States for the privilege of banking, and are entitled to the exclusive benefits of the circulation within the safe limits of their credit. To be extent that the Notes of a foreign justitution form any part of that circulation, to hat extent are the Stockholders of our own banking Establishments injured. As means of remittance, the Notes of the Pennsylvanian Bank may be convenient; but for all comprereial ends the domestic exchauges are now as low as can be reasonably required. That Institution has borrowed a name to which it is not entitled, and this factitions advantage enables it in part to keep in bills out for a considerable period, and has beyond the natural sphere of their circulation. Let those pacts of the country whit will submit to have their local encoded in supplanted by that of a foreign Institution, continue thus to pay a profit to the Suckholders of the Pennsylvania Bans the Sorkholders of the Pennsylvania Bank on the inere use of its credit, while they abrides the profits of the Stockholders of their own institutions, but we see no reason that other parts of the Union should yield his boon.
