South Carolina Legislature.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

FRIDAY Dec. 14, 1838.

SIX O'CLOCK, P. M.

Mr. Perry called up the report of the committee of Ways and Means, on a bill to authorize the South Western Rail Road Bank to establish Branches and Agencies in this State, and the bill was read a second time, and ordered to the Senate.

The Report of the committee on Incorporations, on the petitions of sundry citizens of Cheraw and its vicinity, for the establishment of a Rail Road from the North Carolina line, to Columbia, by way of Cheraw, and on a bill to incorporate the Metropolitan Rail Road Company, was agreed to, and the substituted bill, under the above title, was read a second time, clause by clause, amended and ordered to the Senate.

The Report of the Committee on Ways and Means on a bill to authorize a subscription in behalf of the State, to the South Western Rail Road Bank, was taken up for the second reading, and read, clause by clause. Mr. Elmore proposed an amendment to the 3rd section, providing that the amount subscribed be raised by issuing State Stock. Mr. Memminger opposed the amendment, and advocated the passage of the bill, which was also supported by Messrs. Desaussure, Perry and A. W. Thomson, and opposed by Messrs. Colcock and Bellinger. The following motions were then made: By Mr. Bellinger, to postpone the bill to the 1st January; withdrawn: By Mr. Elmore, to lay the bill on the table, and print his amendment; rejected: By Mr. Colcock, to strike out the enacting clause, negative.

On the question of sending the bill to the Senate, Mr. Elmore called for the Yeas and Nays which were ordered by the House, and were Yeas 60, Nays 46.

So the bill was ordered to be sent to the Senate. Adjourned.

IN SENATE.

SATURDAY, Dec. 15.

The Senate met pursuant to adjournment. Mr. Huger submitted the report of the committee on Incorporations, on the report of the committee of the House, on the bill to incorporate the Pendleton Manufacturing Company; ordered that it be placed among the orders of the day.

On the report of the same committee, on the bill to incorporate the Metropolitan Rail Road Company; ordered that it be placed among the orders of the day.

Mr. Alston submitted the report of the committee on Banks, on the bill from the House, to authorize the South Western Rail Road Bank to establish Branches and Agencies in this State; ordered for consideration on Monday.

Mr. Glover submitted a Resolution authorizing the Chair to nominate committees of inspection for the Bank of the State of South Carolina, and its branches; and that a message be sent to the House of Representatives, requesting the appointment of similar committees, to act in conjunction with the committee of the Senate; ordered for consideration on Monday.

The President called the attention of the Senate to the following report from the House: The report of the committee of Ways and Means, on that part of the Governor's message in relation to the subscription on the part of the State, to the South Western Rail Road Bank, and a bill to authorize the subscription of the State to the South Western Rail Road Bank; read the first time and referred to the committee on finance.

On Motion of Mr. DeTreville, Ordered That a message be sent to the House proposing to go into an election for President and Directors of the Bank of the State of South Carolina, on Monday, at twelve o'clock.

A message was received from the House, proposing to the Senate to go into an election for President and Directors of the Bank of the State of South Carolina, at 1 o'clock, to-day, and immediately thereafter, to the election of Lieutenant Governor; ordered to lie on the table.

On motion of Mr. Verrier, Ordered, that the Senate proceed to the orders of the day.

A Bill entitled "A Bill to prevent the use of deadly weapons," was read the second time, clause by clause, and by sundry amendments, the yeas and nays being required on ordering the bill to the House of Representatives, were Yeas 27, Nays 13.

So the bill was ordered to the House for concurrence.

"A bill entitled "A Bill to prevent intemperance," was then called up for consideration.

Mr. Jeter moved that the further consideration of the bill be postponed to the 1st of January next, and the yeas and nays being required, were as follows: Yeas—Messrs. Alston, Beatty, Cannon, Carr, Caughman, Dubose, Dunovant, Goodwyn, Gribbald, Gourdine, Jeter, Jones, Lawton, Littlejohn, Massey, Mims, Peay, Powe, Quash, and Stone—20.

NAYS—Hon. A. Patterson, President, Messrs. Bennett, Crawford, Dawson, DeTreville, English, Evans, Glover, Gregg, Heriot, Higgins, Norris, Rhet, Scott, Verrier, Smart and Wilson—17.

So the bill was postponed.

The Senate took a recess until six o'clock.

SIX O'CLOCK, P. M. The Senate met again and proceeded to business.

The report of the Committee on Finance, on the bill to loan the credit of the State to secure any loan which may be made to the President and Directors of the Louisville, Cincinnati and Charleston R. Road Company, was ordered for consideration on Monday.

A Report of the committee on Federal Relations, on the report from the House, on that part of the Governor's message in relation of specie payments, and the trade and commerce of the country, ordered for consideration on Monday. Adjourned.

H. OF REPRESENTATIVES. SATURDAY, Dec. 15.

The House met pursuant to adjournment. The Speaker brought to the view of the House a communication from Dr. Thomas Smith, Lieutenant Governor, declining the acceptance of that office; laid on the table.

The Senate sent with its concurrence, a Resolution appointing a committee to examine the Books and Records in the office of the Secretary of State and Comptroller General, and to provide for the repairs of the same, &c. Also, the report of the committee on Federal Relations, on the controversy between the States of Georgia and Maine; referred to the House; also the following Bills, which were read the first time and ordered for a second reading on Monday.

A Bill to authorize the President and Directors of the Louisville, Cincinnati and Charleston Rail Road Company to increase the rates of compensation at the Charleston and Hamburg Rail Road, in certain cases, and to grant certain vacant lots in the town of Columbia.

A Bill more effectually to prevent Gambling.

The Senate also returned a Bill to authorize the formation of the Charleston, Georgetown and All Saints Rail Road Company, which received its third reading; was passed, the title changed to "an Act" and sent to the Senate.

The orders of the day were taken up: The following bills were read the second time and ordered to the Senate, together with the reports on them.

A Bill to establish the Santee Bridge Company.

A Bill to provide for the increase and preservation of the Library of the Court of Appeals in Charleston.

A Bill to authorize the Commissioners of Public Buildings of Georgetown, to Register in every building, the names of the town districts transcribed into suitable books of record, &c. and the report of the Judiciary committee against it, was, on motion of Mr. Middleton, laid on the table.

A Bill from the Senate, directing a census to be taken of the free white inhabitants of the State, was read the second time, amended, on motion of Mr. Bellinger, and ordered to be returned.

On motion of Mr. Elmore, a message was ordered to the Senate proposing to proceed at 1 o'clock to the election of President and Directors of the Bank of the State of South Carolina, and immediately thereafter, to that of Lieutenant Governor.

On motion of Mr. Phillips, the special order of the day, a Bill to establish a Toll Bridge over the Savannah River near Augusta, and the report of the committee on Roads, &c. on the same subject, were taken up, and elicited a debate between Messrs. J. A. Calhoun, Perry, Memminger, and Desaussure, in favor of, and Messrs. Phillips, Burt, Wardlaw, Dawkins, Bellinger, and Frost, against the bill, after which, on motion of Mr. Phillips, the enacting clause of the bill was stricken out by the following vote: the yeas and nays having been ordered, on motion of Mr. Calhoun, and the Speaker, Mr. F. H. Wardlaw, and Mr. Griffin, having been excused from voting, because they had acted as counsel in the case between the parties; Yeas 78—Nays 31.

The Senate sent a message proposing to go into the election of President and Directors of the Bank of the State of South Carolina, at 10 o'clock on Monday; laid on the table.

A Bill concerning the Thompsonian system of the practice of Medicine; was read the second time, and having been discussed by Messrs. Whitefield and H. H. Thomson, in the affirmative, and Messrs. E. G. Palmer, Perry, Colcock, and Phillips in the negative, a motion was made by Mr. Colcock, to amend by striking out the Bill, in order to insert another under the title of a Bill, to repeal the penalties imposed upon the practice of physic or surgery, and the sale of drugs without license. On the question of so amending; the yeas and nays were ordered, and are as follows: Yeas—Hon. D. L. Wardlaw, Speaker, Messrs. Consequently the Bill was ordered to the Senate.

Mr. J. P. Reed recorded his vote in the negative, on the amendment of Mr. Colcock.

The House took a recess till 6 o'clock.

SIX O'CLOCK, P. M. The two following Bills, which had received two readings in the Senate, were read the first time; and ordered to the second reading on Monday.

A Bill to vest the reversionary interests of the State in the Catawba Indian Lands to leases thereof, and secure the sustenance and support of the remnant of the tribe of Catawba Indians.

A Bill to prevent the use of deadly weapons; the last ordered to be printed, on motion of Mr. Desaussure.

On motion of Mr. Phillips, a Bill to establish certain Roads, Bridges and Ferries, was taken up, read the second time, clause by clause, amended, on motion of sundry members, agreed to, and ordered to the Senate.

A Bill to fix the times for holding the Courts of Equity for Williamsburg, was called up by Mr. Desaussure, read the second time and ordered to the Senate.

The following Bills from the Senate, were read the first time, and ordered to be read again on Monday.

A Bill to amend the tenth section of an Act giving to Masters and Commissioners, in Equity, the power to grant Injunctions.

A Bill to increase the penalties of the bonds required of the Sheriffs and Ordinaries of Marlborough.

A Bill to render Auctioneers, Brokers and Vendue Masters, liable in certain cases to the payment of the election of Tax Collectors for each of the Districts of Anderson and Pickens.

A Bill to amend an Act entitled an Act to prevent obstructions to the passage of fish up the several rivers of this State, passed 19th December, 1827.

A Bill to permit Chancellor Harper to be absent from the State.

The following Bills were read the second time, and ordered to the Senate.

A Bill to authorize the sale of the real estate of Alexander Downer, and for other purposes.

A Bill to repeal so much of an Act to organize the Courts of this State, passed 21st of December, 1836, as relates to the election of Commissioners in Equity for Chesterfield and Marlborough.

A Bill to enlarge the powers of the Recorder of the city of Charleston. Adjourned to 10 o'clock A. M. on Monday.

IN SENATE.

MONDAY, Dec. 17.

The Senate met at 10 o'clock, A. M., and the Clerk read the Journal of Saturday.

A message was received from the House concurring with the message sent from the Senate, proposing to go into an election of the President and Directors of the Bank of the State of South Carolina at 1 o'clock.

Mr. Huger submitted the report of the committee on Incorporations on the bill to incorporate the Bivingsville Manufacturing Company; and on motion, it was ordered to be placed among the orders of the day.

Mr. Gregg submitted the report of the committee on the bill from the House, to provide for the increase and preservation of the Library of the Court of Appeals of Charleston; ordered for consideration to-morrow.

The Chair called the attention to the following papers from the House of Representatives:

A Bill to repeal so much of the 4th section of the act to organize the Courts of this State, as relates to the Commissioners in Equity, of the Districts of Chesterfield and Marlborough; read the first time and referred to the Committee on the Judiciary.

A Bill to repeal the penalties heretofore imposed on the practice of Physic, Surgery, and the sale of Drugs without license; read the first time, and referred to the committee on Grievances.

A Bill to fix the time for holding the Courts of Equity for Williamsburg District; read the first time, and referred to the committee on the Judiciary.

A Bill to enlarge the powers of the Recorder of the City of Charleston, read the first time; and referred to the committee on the Judiciary.

On motion of Mr. Gregg, ordered, that the bill of the Senate, in reference to the same powers, be recommitted to the Judiciary committee.

A Bill to establish certain Roads, Bridges, and Ferries, was read the first time, and referred to the committee on Roads, Bridges, and Ferries.

A Bill to authorize the sale of the real estate of Alexander Downer, and for other purposes; read the first time, and referred to the committee on Schools.

A Bill to incorporate the Pendleton Manufacturing Company; read a third time, passed, changed the title so as to read "an Act," &c. and ordered to be returned to the House.

A Bill to raise supplies for the year 1839, read the third time.

The Senate's bill to incorporate the Union Insurance and Trust Company of South Carolina, having been read twice in the House, was read the third time, passed, the title changed to "an Act," and sent to the House of Representatives for concurrence.

A Bill, directing a census to be taken of the free white inhabitants of this State, was read a third time, passed, the title changed to "an Act," and ordered to be sent to the House for concurrence, and that three hundred copies be printed for the use of the members.

A Bill to authorize the City Council of Charleston, to close and discontinue Ellery Street, was read a third time, passed, the title changed to "an Act," and sent to the House for concurrence.

Mr. Huger submitted the report of the committee on Incorporations, on the Bill from the House to authorize the sale of the real estate of Alex. Downer, deceased, and for other purposes; ordered to lie on the table.

A Bill to lend the credit of the State to secure any loan, made by the Louisville Cincinnati and Charleston R. Road Company; read the second time and ordered that it be returned to the House.

The Senate then proceeded to the Resolutions of the House, and went into ballot for President and Directors of the Bank of the State of South Carolina. On its return, the orders of the day were suspended.

Mr. Gregg submitted the report of the committee on the bill to repeal so much of the 4th section of an Act to organize the courts of this State, as relates to the election of Commissioners in Equity, for the Districts of Chesterfield and Marlborough ordered for consideration to-morrow.

Mr. Wilson offered a resolution, directing that a correct copy of an Act, entitled an Act, to organize the courts of this State, be printed among the Acts of this session; which was agreed to.

The Senate resumed the orders of the day.

A bill to define the terms on which the State will aid in the construction of Turpike Roads; read a second time and ordered to be returned to the House.

On motion of Mr. Bennett, the orders of the day were again suspended, for the purpose of receiving the report of the committee on Finance, on a bill to authorize a subscription on behalf of the State, for stock of the South Western Rail Road Bank, and

On motion of Mr. Bennett, the Senate resolved itself into Committee of the Whole, to consider the bill, and the President appointed Mr. Glover to the Chair.

On motion of Mr. Huger, it was ordered, that Gen. R. Y. Hayne be invited to take a seat in the Senate, for the purpose of giving information respecting the bill, and after some discussion

Mr. Rhet submitted an amendment which was adopted.

On Motion of Mr. Huger, the Committee rose, reported progress, and the President resumed his seat.

The Senate then took up the bill, when Mr. Verrier moved the postponement of the bill until the first of January, and the yeas and nays being required are as follows: Yeas—Messrs. Beatty, Canon, Crawford, Dubose, English, Evans, Goodwyn, Higgins, Jeter, Massey, Moore, Peay, Powe, Scott, Stone, Verrier, and Wilson—17.

NAYS—Hon. A. Patterson, President, Messrs. Alston, Bennett, Carr, Caughman, Dawson, DeTreville, Dunovant, Glover, Gregg, Gribbald, Heriot, Huger, Jenkins, Littlejohn, Mims, Murdock, Norris, Quash Rhet and Smart—21.

So the bill was not postponed.

The bill was then read clause by clause and, after sundry amendments, was agreed to, and ordered to be returned to the House.

A Bill to authorize the South Western Rail Road Bank to establish agencies and branches in this State; read a second time, agreed to, and ordered to be returned to the House.

A Bill to amend an Act entitled an Act to amend the City of Charleston; read a second time, agreed to, and ordered to the House.

A Bill to make appropriations for the year 1839; laid the bill on the table.

A Bill to amend the Militia Laws of this State; laid the bill on the table.
