I AM of opinion that all fevers are a unity of disease from the mildest intermittent up to the highest grade of yellow fever, and that the different denominations of fevers, are simple owing to some particular state of the atmosphere or to some peculiar condition of the system; and with slight variations, such as I have made, my treatment should be the same. I am also of opinion that this must be the prevailing theory of the day, or how it is that physicians cure fevers throughout with Calomel and other depletives.

Description and treatment of Bilious Intermittent or Ague and Fever. Bilious Fever. 3dly. Typhus or Nervous, and all other fevers by whatever name they may be called.

1st. Of Intermittent or Fever and Ague. I consider all fevers of an intermittent character which cool off once in twenty-four hours, whether preceded by a chill or not; or whether the fever and chill rise and continue together; or if there be no chill at all. Sometimes fever of this character continues 24 or 48 hours without intermission, and sometimes it occurs only every third day. Nine tenths of the fevers of this state, and most other states of this union, partake more or less of this character, and in all their various appearances the treatment should be the same. This medicine cures by correcting the bile, giving tone and energy to the stomach and bowels, and thereby communicating health and strength to the whole system. It is also possessed of such singular and admirable properties, that it does not sicken the stomach, nor operate on the bowels as a purgative. It breaks the fever in from 24 to 48 hours, during which time the patient receives no sensible benefit from it, but finds himself suddenly well without being conscious of its mode of operation. There is no arsenic or any other article of a poisonous nature in this medicine. It is entirely harmless; women in any situation may take it with perfect safety; and if double the quantity herein recommended was taken, no bad effects would be produced by it. The increased demand for this medicine, has induced me in future to prepare it only in the form of pills, as the transportation of vials is both inconvenient and unsafe. For grown persons or children who prefer taking it in a liquid form, it can be prepared conveniently by any person in the following manner: pound twelve pills well, put the preparation into a vial, and pour two common sized table spoonfuls of whiskey or water to it—spirits of any kind are best. Any other quantity of the liquid may be prepared at the same time, by increasing or lessening the quantity of the medicine in the same proportion as described above.

Treatment.—If the patient prefers taking a purge or purge before he commences the use of this medicine, I have no objection, but it is rarely if ever necessary. He can drink cold water or make use of any other liquid suitable for a sick person, without the least danger, or suffering the slightest inconvenience from it. A grown person will take for a dose a pill or common sized tea spoonful of the liquid every two hours, both day and night, until the disease is broken; children 2 or 10 years old will take 30 or 40 drops, and those three or four years old will take 15 or 20 drops, and infants 3 or 4 weeks old will take from 3 to 6 drops, repeated and continued as recommended for grown persons. But as persons are very subject to a relapse or return of this disease, whether they are cured in this or any other way, it would be well to continue taking three or four doses a day until the strength and complexion are restored, and particularly if the person has already had several relapses. One box will cure two persons of a common attack of ague and fever. Before the liquid is taken the vial should be well shaken.

2dly. Of Bilious Fever. This is a more obstinate and dangerous disease than intermittent ague and fever, there are generally three or four days indisposition previous to the onset of this disease, and frequently chilly sensations for a day or two after. When this disease is properly formed it rarely yields to any treatment under 2 or 10 days, and sometimes much longer.

3dly. Of Typhus or Nervous Fever. This is still much more obstinate and dangerous disease than bilious fever, and apparently more so at the commencement. It often continues fifteen or twenty days with scarcely any remission or intermission, with great prostration of body and depression of mind. It may be well to observe that typhus fever is most common in the winter and spring, and bilious fever in the summer and fall.

In the first stage of all fevers, it is common for the tongue to be coated with a whitish color, and if the fever is not broken and runs into the second stage, it is apt to assume a yellowish brown color, and in the third and last stage of fevers, (and particularly if they are of a high grade and malignant character) the tongue is apt to assume a dark brown color, of different degrees of moisture; sometimes it is exceedingly dry; in this stage of the disease the patient is often sensible of a hot or burning sensation in the stomach. The symptoms of these two diseases are so much alike in their first stage that physicians are often misled as to their real character, nor does it matter materially, because the treatment of both should be pretty much the same, with this exception, that typhus fever does not require nor will it bear as much strong sickening medicine as bilious fever.

Treatment. In the first stage of the two last diseases, I give a purge or one or two small doses of calomel or some other medicine that will operate upon the stomach and bowels. Under any circumstances I object to giving more strong medicine, and am decidedly of opinion that repeated doses of such operating medicines do more harm than good. After this operation on the stomach and bowels (and even without it) if several days have elapsed and my patient become weak, I commence with the pills and drops, and give a dose every three hours, that is eight doses in each twenty four hours, with a regular use of Virginia snake-root, or some other sweating tea, such as sassafras or balsam. Should the patient suffer much with pain in the head, back or elsewhere, give twenty or twenty-five drops of laudanum at night, if the grown person (children should take less corresponding with their age) and should be much debilitated from a continuation of the disease, and customers are particularly invited to call and examine for themselves. **Furman Institution.**  
FOR the classical department of this Institution, the Board of Trustees have elected the Rev. N. W. Hodges as Principal, and the Rev. P. T. Hammond, Steward and Farmer. The Principal has also secured Mr. John Davis as Assistant teacher, for the ensuing year. This school, therefore, will go into operation on the 2d Monday in January next, under the superintendance of Mr. Hodges.—The Principal and Assistant are both experienced teachers, and each by his advancement for the South Carolina College. Mr. Hammond has served for 30 months past, as steward and planter, and his fair to fill his station with satisfaction to all parties.

The rates of Board and Tuition will be fixed at the next meeting of the Board, with a variation from the term of a year, which will be \$100 for board, and from \$20 to \$40 per annum for tuition, payable half year in advance. Students will be required to labor two and a half hours in each day, for which they will receive reasonable compensation; to be deducted from their board in the last session. Parents or guardians may have their sons prepared either for the Junior or lower classes in College; or having their instructions suited to a high order of English education.

The Principal has resolved to enforce strict discipline; and cultivate the moral as well as the intellectual powers of the youth committed to his care. His efforts in this way will be seconded by the Executive Committee, who are determined to take every practical measure to remove temptations, as far as possible from this Institution, which are calculated to lead the students into immorality or disorder. The Constitution and laws of this Institution will be enforced to any one who will apply to either of the members of the Board of Trustees.
