one third, and some years one-half of the crop; but from the lateness of the season, and the very small quantity picked, we cannot put the average of this Island at over 50 lbs. clean Cotton per acre. This estimate has been made by your committee without reference to the destruction that may be caused by the Caterpillar; the second brood having recently made their appearance, are making rapid progress in many fields, two of which we visited, and some of the pods destroyed by this rapacious worm are herewith exhibted. Your committee are pleased to report, that the Corn crop has been a fair one, and the Potato crop is unusually promising. (Signed) JOSEPHB. HINSON,
