TO GET A CROP OF OATS.  
Amidst the drought of the present year the editor of the Visitor has been highly successful in a crop of oats. Land which yielded less than half a ton of hay to the acre in the summer of 1839 was ploughed up in the spring of the 20th of May, 1840—about forty loads of manure were spread in the acre; a portion of it was turned under the sod—a portion was ploughed to the depth of four inches, and a portion was simply harrowed under; and the land produced a very decent crop of Indian corn and potatoes. The original sod was hardly disturbed either in the last year's cultivation or the ploughing of the present spring. The land was simply ploughed once the present spring, and six bushels only of oats sowed upon four acres. The oats came up so thick that several persons pronounced there would be nothing of them early in June; they branched and spread in the course of the summer so that they were as heavy upon the ground as if double the quantity had been sowed. Some of them were five feet in height, and the straws of the size of pipe stems. The whole piece with the exception of the trampling and rolling over in some spots by three unruly boys upon the Sabbath stood up well—much better and stronger than it would have done had the blades been more numerous. The piece has been carefully reaped; and the result is two hundred and seventy five stacks of twelve bundles each, making 12 loads, which will weigh at least 12 tons. The opinion is, that the four acres will turn out full three hundred bushels of oats. We have seen not another such piece of oats in this part of New Hampshire; if any man has produced more, we invite him to communicate the fact through the columns of the Monthly Visitor.—*Governor Hill's (New Hampshire) Monthly Visitor.*

HAMBURG, Oct. 13.  
The late accounts received from Europe, although somewhat flat, had no effect on our Cotton market, if we except the day on which they arrived when prices gave way a fraction, but has since gained upon and overreached the previous day's quotations viz 6 to 8 cts. We now give as the general outlines of the market prices, 6 to 8 cts. Principal sales 8 cts. and a good demand at these rates. The arrivals, since our last dates have been large by wagon, and we notice on yesterday some wagons from the Georgia side the owners having come to our side for a better market. Buyers look for a heavy business until the next summer closes the cotton transactions.  
Bagging.—The market is well supplied, and no change in prices have taken place since our last. Hemp 35 to 25. Tow 17 to 20.  
Sugar.—The merchants have large stocks on hand, and prices have undergone no change.  
Flour.—The article is pretty low, and selling at \$5 to \$6 for country. Canal tone.  
Salt.—The orders which lately went forward, have supplied our market with a heavy stock. In bulk 6 1/2 cts per bushel. Sack 8 1/2 cts.  
Freights.—To Charleston for square bales cotton 35 cts per hundred pounds; for round bales 35 cts per hundred. To Savannah round and square bales 50 cts per bale.
