gland a few days later than the December Overland mail. Latest from Mexico.—The schooner William Penn, arrived here yesterday from Tampico, which place she left on the 21st ult. The Courier thus sums up the news which was verbally communicated.

The mills at Ashton, Staleybridge, Lees Glossop, and Worsley, are yet without hands, but from what I have been told today on a personal visit they will be going again on Monday. There is not the least symptom of riot or political disaffection, either at Ashton or Staleybridge, and it is not thought requisite to station any troops in those towns.
