

**Painting Houses.**—It has long been a subject of inquiry as to the best time to apply paint to the clapboards of houses for durability. Repeated experiments have been made within twenty-five years, which have resulted in conviction that paint applied between November and March will stand more than twice as long as that which is spread in the warmest weather. The reason is obvious; for in cold weather, the oil and the component parts of the paint form a hard substance on the surface of the clapboards, nearly as hard as glass, and not easily erased, or even cut with a sharp knife, and will not soon wear off, whereas, paints applied in the months of July and August, and more especially if in a severe drought, the oil immediately penetrates into the wood, like water into a sponge leaving the lead nearly dry, which will soon wear off.

**Revolutionary Soldiers.**—There are in the United States, just one hundred soldiers of the Revolution on the pension list, over 100 years of age. The oldest man on the list is Michael Hale, Union county, Pa., who is in his 115th year.

### Commercial.

In consequence of not receiving a letter from our correspondent, we copy the following account of the Hamburg Market from the Journal.

**HAMBURG, October 25.**  
Our city presents quite a business appearance. Produce wagons crowd the streets, and our merchants are driving away at a fair rate. The receipts of cotton for the last week amount in all to about 3500 bales; most of which were sold on arrival—but little stored for uncertain prices. The Rail Road is blocked up with bags of cotton as expected, and the boats are carrying on a good business to Savannah and Charleston, the river being in the best boating order, owing to the rains within the last two days. Cotton.—Notwithstanding the low prices, heavy sales have been made at prices ranging from 6 to 7 cents; principal sales 6 1/2 to 6 3/4. The late European accounts will have some effect on our market, and prices may still recede a fraction.

**Augusta, October 27.**  
Remarks.—It would seem that the accounts from the other side of the Atlantic have had no influence on our market, for it has been extremely dull since our last review, though the sales have been comparatively large. The receipts have been large, from eight to ten thousand bales have arrived in the course of the week at Hamburg and Augusta; about 3500 in Hamburg, and the remainder in this market by wagons and mostly by rail road. The article as it arrives is freely offered for sale; and the large quantity in market, produces inactivity and dullness even among the operators, who are few, and operates only when bargains can be obtained. The markets of the north, and of Charleston and Savannah, do not encourage buyers here. To give more animation the accounts of the 19th and 20th of this month, which are expected by two steam packets from Liverpool, in the latter part of next week, must be of a favorable nature. We would not be surprised of a slight advance in the Liverpool and Havre markets, but to be of a permanent nature, the extent of the crop in this country will have to be taken into consideration. The calculations in Europe are decidedly based on a large crop; whether it will be so or not cannot now be ascertained. Contradictory accounts of the Alabama crop have been received. About a week or two ago, it was stated that the cotton had been injured in Alabama by rain and worms. The latest account received represents the crop as abundant, and its extent to be more than that of last year.—With these circumstances before us, it is impossible to judge of the condition all the cotton markets will be in when more certainty will exist of the amount of the demand and of the supply. At the present low prices operators in this article cannot hazard much; but, under any circumstances, our advice to the planters is to realize. As we stated above, the market is dull, and, we may say, in a declining state. The sales have been at lower prices than quoted last week. We quote for the principal sales of crops 5 1/2 to 6 3/4 cents. And we quote the range of prices 5 1/2 to 7 in round, and 7 1/2 to 8 in square bales; choice parcels 7 1/2 to 8 in square bales.—Constitutionalist.

**COLUMBIA, October 27.**  
Cotton.—A decline 1/8 to 1/4 of a cent has taken place since our last report, in consequence of the unfavorable advances from Europe. The market has been brisk and animated, however, notwithstanding. The article has come in quite freely, and met with prompt purchasers, at prices ranging from 6 to 7 1/2 cents, and in some instances 7 1/2 has been paid. On Thursday last, about 1,800 bales were purchased from wagons.

**CHARLESTON, Oct. 29, 1842.**  
Cotton.—There was a good attendance of dealers at the opening of the market on Saturday last, and throughout that day and Monday a fair business was done at the prices given in our review of the 22d inst.; but subsequently holders refused operating unless at a reduction, which was in some instances submitted to. The market, however, since Monday has been in a languid and unsettled state, and we have for the present ceased quotations. The receipts of the week are 9497 bags, and the sales in same time 6530 bags, at prices varying from 5 1/2 to 8 1/2 cents per lb. About 15 bags Sea Island sold at 21, and 35 prime 25 and upwards, and 87 bags stained do. from 6 to 12 1/2 cts. per lb.—Courier.
