Grass Lots .- There is a considerable degree of interest excited throughout this State, towards the improvement of stock generally, of hogs and cattle more particularly. Some have been disappointed of reaping the benefits they expected, and their want of success may discourage others from attempting similar improve-ments. The great want of success, however, must be attributed to the want of forty acres of land, more or less, where green pastures. No man can have a good stock of cantle without either a good natural pasture or one that is cultivated. The fine English and Kentucky cattle do not owe their excellence to blood alone, however important this may be, but to rich pastures and kindly treatment also. James Marshall for John Marshall vs not afford the time, trouble, and expense of a few acres of grass lots for spring and summer, and of rye for winter pasturage. Henry Wertz vs S. W. Holley, one sorrel the 16th of September. especially for his milch cows and calves. he had better abandon all idea of improving his cattle, by purchasing fine-blooded stock. But we believe that all of our planters can afford these -not only afford them. but that he will be amply repaid. A small stock well kept, and judicious y improved by the introduction of the imported breeds, will prove far more profitable than a large neglected stock. Many planters milk twenty and thirty cows, and yet have barely enough of milk and butter for family consumption, whereas, ten cows well kept would afford twice as much milk and butter as the largest family in the State would consume. The overplus would be clear gain, and more than repay the trouble and expense of the artificial pasturage necessary too keeping them.

It is asserted on high authority, in fact it has been demonstrated by actual experiment, that almost an" of the Virginia and Kentucky grasses wi. grow tuxuriantly in this State, if time is added to the soil. We heard Mr. Ruffin remark that he saw as fine clover growing in Edgefield, as he ever saw in Virginia, and Professor Eller of the College, has a small lot of it, which is said to be equal to any that can be seen in the Northern States. Judge O'Neall has tried it in Newberry we believe with very great success, and so have many of thers. To make it, however, a really progtable, pasture, lime or ashes should be used: and surely any planter may afford enough of lime for at least a few acres.

The Lucerne we know grows well here. and for soiling (that is, cutting and leeding in the green state.) is a very valuable grass." The Musquite grass has been conted several years by Col. Itamp'an and if we mistake not, is a very valuable one: it grows loxurisatly, and affords a very rien pasture. We shall endeavor to gain more accurate information respecting it, and will ref - to it again.

If the planter cannot sow largely enough of these grasses to benefit his stock generally, be can, at least, for his culves, and for a few mileb cows, and thus render these few more valuable to him than his present large number. It requires but little trouble to reclaim a few acres of meadow, and make it a rich and abundant pasture.
