## MISCELLANEOUS.

From the N. Y. Republic.

EXTRAORDINARY DISCLOSURES. The mysterious disappearance, about two years since, of an individual named John R, Rickett, formerly an Episcopal minister, (in which sacred capacity he has frequently officiated in the pulpit of Brooklyn and Newark) but more recently a dry goods merchant in Worcester, Mass., in partnership with Mr. Charles Blake, was a circumstance of too much moment to numerous merchants in this city and Boston, and to the people of Worcester and other places, not to be still fresh in the memory of very many persons in this section of the Union.

We are not aware that since that time any solution of the mystery, (which excited much public interest at the time) has ever appeared; and the development of it now, will be regarded with considerable curiosity. That ci devant preacher and merchant is now in the Brooklyn prison, by virtue of a judgment against him under the law to punish fraudulent debtors: as, also, a charge of various smuggling transactions, for which he was, on Monday last arrested by officer A. M. C. Smith, of this city.

The history of the career of this individual, since his memorable departure from Worcester with three thousand dollars. under pretence of paying New York business debts, as delivered by himself since his arrest, has been furnished us; and we must say that it presents a picture of villainy rarely to be drawn from two years of the life of ordinary scoundrels. Soon after he left Worcester, it will be recollected, his wife received a letter informing her that his hat had been found in Pike street dock in this city; and that he was drowned.

Through this letter the story reached the newspapers, and was every where published, though not by every body believed. He now acknowledges that was a fabrication, and that the letter was written at his request by a person then and still attached one of the city papers as a reporter. He immediately left for Europe, leaving behind him debts in this city to the amount of \$2500, and in Boston \$8000.

In the spring of 1843 he returned to America, in one of the New York packets, on board which, with the assistance of the steward, he smuggled ashore \$2500 worth of English bronze. On leaving England he assumed the name of John II. Raynor, which he retained after his arrival, until about four weeks since. Upon his arrival he started the ideal firm of Roselt & Co., to conduct the business of which he obtained the services of Mr. M. H. Buckley of

Buckley disposed of the bronze of his

employers, and in a short time an invoice of bronze arrived from England to Roselt and Co., which required a false invoice to be sworn to. On discovering the nature of this transaction, Mr Buckley promptly re-fused to acceed to it; and Mr. Ricket himself perpetrated the required perjury, and bronze from the custom house at its true value, after a good deal of difficulty—the falsity of the invoice was detec-ted by Mr. Edgar one of the appraisers. Subsequently other lavoices of bronze to the fictitious firm were received at this port and Boston; and after tampering with a number of persons, and endeavoring to suborn them to perjure themselves to get his invoices through the Custom Bonse, he finally was obliged to pay the full du-fies on them. In the Boston Custom House, however, he was so successful, by means of spurious affidavits purporting to be made by the English manufacturer of Ford, the article of whom he purchased, and oth-

The bill of lading for the Boston impor-tations he would assign to Harnden & Co., and that respectable firm, altogether ignorant of the character of the value in London, with their invoice, readily obtained the goods described. In this manner he has received two importations, worth \$5 | March 27

000, invoiced at about one fourh the actual

value. The whole value of his importations within a year past, is about nine thousand dollars, while the invoices at the two Cueom Houses named, do not represent that value as above two thousand dollars --While thus successfully engaged in this nefairous husiness, one of his commercial creditors, to whom he owed one thousand dollars, discovered him, and by commencing a prosecution against him for having fraudulently contracted the debt, obtained his incarceration in the Brooklyn prison. He was making his arrangements to leave for England as soon as he could extricate himself from that difficulty, when the fortunate detection of his villainly by the proper authorities led to his arrest by officer Smith, as before stated.

Nature's Nobleman .- The New Orleans Herald relates an anecdote of one of their wealthy citizens. 'A gentleman informed us yesterday, that, after he was burned out on Saturday, he went to John Hagan, Esq. and asked him to rent him a house. The reply was "No, sir, I have no houses to rent to the sufferers; but go to my agent, and ask him for the key of any house I have vacant, and take possession of it. Such acts of kindness and generosity redeem the whole race."

Tried Brandy .- At the last Gloucestershire adjourned sessions, a girl was placed at the bar charged with stealing a pint of brandy (it was produced in court) from her master. The girl was acquitted, but the jury, with exemplary impartially, not only tried the girl but the brandy ton; for they conscientiously emptied the bottle. The liquor being drunk, the jury appended to their verdict, 'below proof.' - Punch.
