MISCELLANEOUS.

The American Newspaper Press .- Mr Jefferson said in his day that the securrillity of the Press drove nearly all the best men of the country from entering or remaining in public life. The degree of degeneracy of the Political Press since the days of Mr. Jefferson it would be difficult. to estimate. Where is the fault ? What is the source of the evil? Is it in the Press itself? Is it the character of its conductors? Or is it in an unhealthy tone of public sentiments? That the vices are to be traced to all these causes of corruption, cannot admit of denial, Its increasing virulence appears to be the reaction of that diseased condition of public taste to which it imparts its own spirit and from which it receives its tone. It is impossibl to suppose its conductors would turnish daily doses of scurrility to those who are its patrons, unless they were relished for their piquancy .- It is inconcervable that the Newspapers, which can only exist by the public breath-which have no element of life but in public opinioncould continue, unceasingly, to discharge any quantity of envenomed personalities, ucless there was a craving want for this species of mental aliment. A diseased condition of the public taste is, therefore, the most active cause-the largest source -of the violence and viruience of the Newspaper Press. The supply is consequently commensurate with the want of that description of talent, if talent it can be called-that most effectually min.sters to this mornid infellectual appente. I nat this may be again traced to be trequency and violence of our party contest admits of as little denial as the lace usell, that our Political press is the most licentions in the world, is indisputable.

It may be said that this description applies to the party newspapers. Where can any other party journals be found within the limits of the United States! The exception are so rare that they preserve at most sickly and precarious exis tence. As our political contests have become more envenomed, too faithfully reflecting the character of those contests. must be the true image of party opinion of party despotism or cease to exist. No presses are sustained that will not one; the behests of party-no Editor is tolera ted unless he submits to its discipline, there is no deficiency of conductors of the press responsive to all party requirements fully sympathizing with the most embittered party feeling --- who aggravate the heats of partizan hostility and give supe radded force to the habit of political vituperation. Thus by the action and re-action of party on the press and the press on party, the land is filled with daily diatribes-with that coarse literature which consists in stringing together abusive epithets of ludicrous combination—with punning on names-with porguant persopalities -that manly characterize journalism in the United States.

Now it may be said that the Political Press might be improved, if educated men, of refinement of manners, were placed at its head. But the same warfare of scurrility that drives statesmen, combining ability with delicacy of sentiment, from the public councils, prevents those most capable, from education and habit, having any agency in the management of the Press. They lack the moral courage to undertake so perilous a retorm. The insatiate wants of the public are also an impediment to improvement in the character of Americau Journalism. The number of papers make it impossible to recruit the corps of Editors, in sufficient numbers. from the best instructed classes of American society. In England, the learned and liberal profession amply supply this want .- In France, her leading statesmen are writers for her Journals. In the United States we have no similar sources of supply. We have flet back on village lawyers and disappointed demagogues, when our pressing wants are supplied .-Charleston Patriot.

The State of S. Carolina.



At a General Assembly begun and holden at Columbia on the fourth Monday in Novem ber, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, and from thence continued by divers adjournments to the 19th day of December in the same year. Bill to alter and amend the first section of the third article of the Constitution.

BE it enacted, by the Senate and House of Representatives, now met and sitting in General Assembly, that the first section o the third article of the Constitution be altered and amended to read as follows :- " The judicial power shall be vested in such superior and or Courts of Law and Equity, as the Legislature shall from time to time direct and es-tablish;" the judges of each hereafter to be elected shall hold their commissions during good behaviour untill they have attained the sixty-five years, but no longer; and the Judges of the Superior Courts shall at stated times receive a compensation for their services which shall neither be increased nor diminished during their continuance in office; but they shall receive no fees of perquisites of office, nor hold any other effice of profit or trust under this State, the United States or any other power."
In the Senate House, the nineteenth day

December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-three. We certify that the above bill has been read during the present Session three times in the House of Representatives, and three times in the Senate, and was agreed to by two-thirds of both Branches of the whole representation.
