At a General Assembly begun and holden at Cclumbia on the fourth Monday in November, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, and from thence continued by divers adjournments to the 19th day of December in the same year. A Bill to alter and amend the first section of the third article of the Constitution.

BE it enacted, by the Senate and House, of Representatives, now met and sitting in General Assembly, that the first section of the third article of the Constitution be altered and amended to read as follows --- 'Fire judicial power shall be vested in saich superior and inferior Courts of Law and Lawity, as the Legislature shall from time to time direct and es-tablish;" the judges of each hereatier to be elected shall hold their commissions during good behaviour untill they have attained the at e of sixty-five years, but no longer; and the Judges' of the Superior Courts shall at stated times receive a compensation for their services which shall neither be increased nor diminished during their continuance in office; but they shall receive no fees of perquisites of office, nor hold any other office of profit or trust under this State, the United States or any other power."

In the Senate House, the nineteenth day of December, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-three. We sertify that the above bill has been read during the present Session three times in the House of Representatives, and three times in the Senate, and was agreed to by two-thirds of both Branches of the whole representation.
